LLANGWM SCOTTISH NOW TAKE ON THE WELSH.

The young llangwm Scottish Dancers, well known in West Wales for their performances of Scottish reels and jigs, are now adding Welsh traditional dancing to their repertoire, with a view to taking part in one of the first events to be held in the Welsh National Botanical Gardens near Carmarthen.

With these prestigious gardens due to open on the 24th. May, the Welsh folk Dance Society is arranging for a Day of Dance just over six weeks later, when Welsh dancers from all parts of the Principality will present a swirl of music and colour that will rival the colourful plants from all parts of the world. In addition to 150 adult dancers and musicians, schools in Pembrokeshire and Carmarthenshire will be sending the best of their Urdd folk dance groups - and amid the 300 dancers present, the Llangwm dancers will have exchanged their kilts, tartans and white dresses for bright Welsh flannel, shawls and black hats.

Earlier in the year Jessica Milward and Jennie Brock joined other young dancers from Broad Haven, Crundale and Tenby in an afternoon of Scottish Dancing along with fellow young enthusiasts from Llantwit Major and the Cardiff area. This was arranged under the auspices of the South Wales branch of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society and inspirational music for dancing was provided by their accordionist, Jim Proudfoot of Swansea.

The dancers meet on Wednesday evenings at 5.30 in LLangwm Village Hall and anyone interested in joining is encouraged to contact Pat Rye on 01646 698463 or Mary and Lynette Kinder on 01437 890189. Although Llangwm Scottish Dancers are a separate group, they run in conjunction with the Houghton Scottish Dancers, whose adult dancers meet on a Monday evening in the Burton Memorial Hall, Houghton.

LLANGWM LONGBOAT ROWING CLUB

The club is now well into its second year and the enthusiasm and interest of its members continues unabated. After a spring refit four boats are now available for practice and there are five regular crews who take part in the Welsh Longboat League Challenge Races and friendlies. This year the Club is introducing a regular scheme for recreational rowing, which is for members who prefer not to race but just to enjoy some gentle rowing; designated Friday evenings are set aside for this activity and hopefully will include a visit to a local watering hole!

So far this year there have been two competitive events (the Aberystwyth race was cancelled) and the Llangwm rowers

have had their share of honours. In the Dinas Head race both the men's and ladies' teams were runners up in the Celtic Longboat and Pembrokeshire Longboat races respectively. The Men's Team comprised Paul Brant, Peter Owen, Andrew Winfield, David Cooke and Ben Cutting as cox; the Ladies' Team was Angela Sweeney, Helen Stewart, Angela Cousins, Lynn Davies and Mandy McGee.

On Sunday 15th. the very exciting Cleddau Race was rowed from Haverfordwest to Neyland and on this occasion two of our Ladies' teams won the Celtic and the Pembrokeshire Longboat races; members of the teams were: Celtic Longboat - Angela Sweeney, Angela Cousins, Helen Brown, Louise Hadley and cox Jayne Richards. Pembrokeshire Longboat - Tricia Chalmers, Brenta Pearn, Jane Jones, Elspeth Thompson and cox Joe Mcloughlin. The Men's Team with Gareth Jones, Paul Brant, Peter Owen, David Cooke and Andrew Winfield cox was fourth. A third Ladies' Team of Lynn Davies, Lis Poland, Fiona Cutting, Mandy McGee with Crispin Cutting as cox, finished in a very creditable time of 1hour 54 minutes.

The rest of the season is just as busy with fortnightly events for the racing crews. On Saturday 17th. June at the start of the Llangwm Festival the Club is offering a trial row to anyone who is interested in seeing what it is all about. From 10 am. to 6pm. longboats with qualified rowers will be waiting at Black Tar for all to try, so please come along and practice your rowing skills with a trip on the river. During the Festival on 25th. June, the L.L.R.C. is to host the Longboat League for the Llangwm League Race, when up to twenty crews are expected to take part in races for junior, men's, women's and mixed crews. Racing starts at 11.30 and will be followed by a barbecue, so please come along and give your support to the teams.

Fundraising events continue with the popular monthly Quiz nights at The Cottage Inn, and on the 30th. June there is a walking Treasure Hunt to which all are welcome.
