ST. THOMAS SURGERY

As the above practice has a branch surgery in Llangwm, the Community Council have a member on the practice Patient Participation Group. This meets on the last Wednesday of every quarter. It discusses improvements and amendments to the N.H.S. service. It looks at new contracts and discusses Practice investments for the future. General concerns regarding the Practice can be aired at the meeting by the public or through the Community Council representative Cllr. Reg Jenkins.

At the meeting of wednesday 26 th. July 2000, amongst the items discussed was the telephone response time. The main difficulty seemed to be early in the morning between 8.30 am and 9.00 am.. Services required later in the day had a far quicker response time. The surgery management team were attempting to quantify the waiting time by monitoring specific calls.

General discussion focused on the impending Government Announcement "21 Century N.H.S.". It appeared that the announcement would be confined to England with the Welsh infrastructure to be given through the Welsh Assembly. No patient would have to wait more than 6 months for an operation and the private sector would use it s facilities to meet the government targets. Patients would no longer be able to go outside Wales for N.H.S. treatment so limiting choice. (St. Thomas Surgery PPG minutes)

Normal consultations are by appointment. The Group Practice aim to hold the Llangwm branch Surgery from 10.30 am. to 12 noon, Monday Wednesday and Friday. Patients are asked to telephone if it is intended to use the branch surgery to confirm there will be a doctor in attendance.

HAVERFORDWEST CITIZENS ADVICE BUREAU

With the help of lottery grants and other charitable trusts the bureau is now able to provide a home visiting service to people who would otherwise be unable to access the office in Haverfordwest.

The aim of the bureau is to give free impartial and confidential advice to everyone. The home visiting service is seen as an important part of enabling the disabled, carers, the sick and those without transport etc. to receive advice when they may need it most.

DOG FOULING

Earlier in the year, the Community Council were asked to comment on Pembrokeshire County Councils proposal to introduce the Dogs (fouling of land) Act 1996. The Community Council were asked to highlight areas where there was a recognised problem with dog fouling.

The playing field was of great concern, children play here, children and adults play sport here. Often games are halted while dog faeces are removed, we ask you to imagine how you would feel if you became covered in dog muck. Parents of small children have to be extremely vigilant, all because of the few inconsiderate, unsociable dog owners. People should be more responsible for their pets. Other areas for concern were the Black Tar picnic area and the Green. However there was a problem throughout the district.

The 1996 Act gave the local authorities powers to introduce local bylaws to control the fouling of land by dogs. A district council or Unitary Authority could itself designate areas of land to which the act applies in accordance with regulations issued by the Secretary of State. Pembrokeshire County Council has designated the whole of the County as an area covered by the Act not just specific areas as highlighted by the Community and Town Councils. From 1st. June 2000 it became an offence for a person in charge of a dog not ti remove faeces left by that dog on designated land. With certain exceptions, the Act applies to all land throughout Pembrokeshire which is open to the air on at least one side and to which the public have access with or without payment. Exceptions include land comprising or running alongside a highway for which the local speed limit is over 40 mph, land used for agriculture or for woodlands and which is predominantly marshland, moor or heath. No offence is committed if the person has a reasonable excuse or the owner, occupier etc. of the land has given consent. Registered blind persons are excepted.

Provision is made for the issue of fixed penalty notices by the local authority officers. The fixed penalty is £25. There are also powers to prosecute through the courts. The Community Council will shortly be sighting reminder signs at points throughout the district but it should be remembered that the Dog (fouling of land) Act 1996 has been applied with exceptions throughout the whole of Pembrokeshire.

Dog Wardens and designated officers can issue notices of a time to dog owners who do not adhere to the Act. Members of the public who witness dog owners contravening the Act or dogs roaming unattended can inform the housing and Regulatory Services at County Hall .01437 775483.

NATURE NEWS

What will you remember most about the first summer of the new millennium?. There were times when "the age of Aquarius" seemed more apt, as day after day it rained. In the longer term however the weather pattern seems to have balanced out, and we enjoyed some wonderfully warm and sunny spells. As I write this on August Bank holiday sunday the weather, as it so often does, has once again confounded the forecasters.. It is a real tonic for all those who have some time off this weekend to be able to enjoy the sunshine and warmth.

We humans are not the only ones to appreciate such conditions. Many insects and other forms of wildlife can only thrive if their environment meets their particular requirements. An example is the Barn owl whose numbers in Great Britain have been declining for some time. It is a species that is only found in the southern half of these islands, and it is here at the very edge of its natural range. As one moves through Europe and the Mediterranean area it is much more common and widely distributed.

Some species of course find the climate here ideal, but are deprived of the opportunity to multiply by the actions of man. Two birds which are declining in numbers are the Curlew, and the Lapwing also Known as the Peewit and more properly the Green Plover. The reason in both cases is the loss of habitat. Successive governments gave grants for the ploughing up and improvement of land for agricultural use of marshy areas, moorland, heath etc. Such areas were the breeding and feeding grounds for the Curlew and their young. Now alas that wonderfully soul- stirring haunting bubbling cry is heard in fewer and fewer places. It was always so evocative of springtime in the Preselis. They are poorer for its loss. The green Plover is a victim of agricultural fashion. It favours spring sown corn as a nesting site, laying its eggs on more or less bare ground. Most corn is now Autumn planted, and all corn is now sprayed with herbicides and pesticides during the growing season. These chemicals may have direct and catastrophic effects on the young chicks who cannot escape by

flight as can the parent birds. Far more immediately such sprays destroy the food sources on which the birds depend. Herbicides destroy "weeds", plants which have immemorially grown on arable land, and are themselves food plants for the insect life against which the pesticides are directed. It was on this insect life that the parent Lapwings depend to feed their young. Life is a web, if one web is damaged it alters the tensions throughout the web and all is distorted.

Such changes as those described have happened in a short space of time. The writer spent nearly fifty years in farming, and can recall seeing corn being hand hoed to kill weeds!. It was for the purpose of making the hoeing of weeds easier that the corn drill was invented.

Of what importance is all this to Llangwm?. During the autumn and winter the Curlews return to their ancestral feeding grounds of foreshore and estuary. The tidal mudflats, so uninviting to humans, are some of the most biologically productive areas on the planets surface. It is their rich harvest of worms and crustacea that provides the sustenance for the wide range of wading birds that we see around our waters at these times. But of course if they cannot breed in sufficient numbers we shall no longer enjoy their visual and harmonic beauty.

Change is necessary all life is change, but we would do well as a species to remember that not all change is necessarily progress; if the word progress means an improvement. It would be more than a pity if our grandchildren inherited a world in which such beautiful birds as those mentioned above no longer existed. Many species have already disappeared through man's greed and lack of forethought. How many more do we have to lose before we come to our senses?. If we destroy nature we destroy ourselves. We can choose to create harmony or holocaust, but time is short.

Ten gardens were opened this year to the delight of our visitors, including a group from the St. David's W.I., plus many others from the village and the surrounding area. Luckily the weather was fine yet again, enabling everyone to enjoy the variety of the gardens and planting schemes.

The Hanging Basket and Container Competition was a new venture which attracted an excellent number of entries, including a number from children in the village, all of whom received a prize. The entries were on display during the Festival Fortnight, making Llangwm look even lovelier than usual. The judging took place at the beginning of July by Gerald White from the Royal Horticultural Society. The results of the various categories were:

Our last participation in the Festival was our contribution of the Millennium Slug to the carnival. Again the weather cleared

just in time to enable everyone to enjoy the floats.

As a result of the various events held by the Gardening Club during the Festival, we were able to donate a considerable sum of money to the Village School. A presentation was made during the school assembly at the end of term when a cheque for £350 was given to Mrs. Mills, the headmistress, and all the children of the school. This money will be used to develop a garden for the school and an area has already been set aside for this purpose with the money being used to purchase plants and benches. The Gardening Club is delighted to have been able to contribute to our school in this way. July saw members making a long anticipated visit to Aberglasny Gardens. On a glorious day and with an inspiring guide, we were able to absorb the atmosphere and history if the gardens, which most of us had only seen on the television series. The gardens are well worth a repeat visit as their development is a long term project which covers many different types of garden, such as the walled garden, woodland areas, water features and so on. Some members of the Club also took part in an exciting visit to Ireland to visit the Powerscourt Estate, the National Gardens Exhibition Centre and the J.F. Kennedy Arboretum - three totally contrasting gardens. The Exhibition Centre has 20 gardens showing different styles and designs including a shaded garden, town garden, garden for the disabled and a family garden. Each of them was full of ideas, all of which were easy to replicate at home and so proved very inspiring. The club may look to organise a similar trip next year if there is sufficient interest.

The end of our Gardening Club year saw the resignation of our Chairman, Peter Bossom. Peter was the inspiration behind the formation of the Club and has worked tremendously hard to get things off the ground. We have all benefited from his enthusiasm, his experience and knowledge and his willingness to help us all with any aspect of gardening. Our new Chairman is Liz Jones and we are also delighted to welcome Sarah Hall, Joe Neal and Eileen Parfitt

onto the committee.

Joe has taken on responsibility for co-ordinating the maintenance of the flowerbed on the Green, once the new planting scheme has been implemented. The bed has already been surveyed and redesigned, as well as being weeded pruned and mulched prior to moving plants in this autumn. We are delighted to be able to contribute to the natural beauty of the village and hope to create a feature of which we can all be proud.

Lastly the Club has been taking part in the Millennium Yew project where thousands of yew trees taken from the Allt Mawr Yew tree in Powys, (which is reputed to be 3000 years old) have been distributed around the country for planting in celebration of the new millennium. Our tree will be planted in the churchyard later in the year with an appropriate ceremony to which we hope as many people as possible from the village will be able to attend. LLANGWM CRICKET CLUB

It is a pleasure to report that the llangwm Youth Team has won the Ormond Youth Cup and brought it home to Llangwm for the first time ever. As an erstwhile "Llangwm" would have said "the boys done well". And won by a fully homebred team too, which says a lot for our village. The contributions of Jo- Jo Francis (32 not out), William Beresford (60 not out and Man of the Match), Andrew Mathias (6 wickets including a hat trick) and Shaun Waller's removal of their star batsman twice (for a pair!) at the start of each innings were only a part of a fantastic all-round team performance in which the fielding of every player was outstanding (and crucial). Our first XI has had to battle hard this year and with player unavailability a problem throughout the season, captain Simon Kiff did a fine job to steer the side to fourth place in division 2.
