

LLANGWM COMMUNITY CENTRE 'A TRUE COMMUNITY RESOURCE'

Since its re-opening on St David's Day, our newly furbished hall has been the venue of an increasing variety of events.

Not only has the Art Class continued to be well attended, the Scottish Dancers developing their skills and the Youth Club maintaining their activities, but two new groups have used the hall for their inaugural meetings.

The Local History Group's first meeting was well attended, and the subsequent talk by Ellen Skyrme saw over 50 people present to hear her fascinating reminiscences of a child-hood in Llangwm.

The Amateur Dramatic Group held its inaugural meeting with an excellent attendance from a wide range of people. There is great enthu siasm for this group who will welcome anyone who would like to take part in any capacity. Our Community Council now hold their monthly meetings in the Village Hall, which has also been the venue for a funding seminar run by the Pembrokeshire Association for Voluntary Services. We have also seen the hall used for both children's and adult's parties. It's great to see the hall serving the purpose for which it was built and providing a true community resource for our village.

JUBILEE JUBILATION

The Jubilee weekend saw a wonderful gathering of the village for a picnic on the rugby field. Despite the early rain, there was a fantastic turnout, with well over 300 people taking part in the village photograph and we are delighted to have been presented with a framed copy to be on permanent display in the hall to remind everyone of this special occasion. The Village Hall Committee provided cream teas and an indoor car boot sale to supplement the sports activities run on the field. The whole event produced an excellent day and a true village occasion enjoyed by everyone who took part.

ARTS AND CRAFTS SUCCESS

The hall also provided a focal point for our annual Llangwm Festival by hosting the Arts & Crafts Exhibition and providing the venue for yet more cream teas and stalls for the carnival. The standard was, as ever, excellent and the organisers and exhibitors should be congratulated for their efforts in producing a show which attracted such a large number of visitors. We are truly fortunate in having so many talented individuals in Llangwm. The Village Hall Committee is delighted to have been presented with a cheque of over £100 by the Festival Committee and Graham Brace as a result of sales and donations during the exhibition. A tremendous 'thank you' to every-

one concerned.

GARDENING CLUB'S 'CASH CROP'

Another 'thank you' is due to the Gardening Club which, this year, is donating over £300 to the Village Hall, raised during the Festival. We are really delighted to have such support from so many organisations and groups in the village and will use the money to further enhance the facilities currently available in the hall.

TEETHING PROBLEMS

One problem which we are currently addressing is that of those people who have difficulty in hearing. The hall's acoustics are bad, with a tremendous echo when anyone is speaking. We are therefore in the process of applying for a grant to install a hearing loop which will enhance the facilities for anyone with a hearing aid. If successful, we should be able to install the loop during the autumn.

PENNIES TO SPEND?

A public meeting was held at the instigation of the Community Council regarding the toilets both at Black tar and at Pill Parks Way. This meeting, held 16 April 2002, was attended by County Council representatives who were proposing the installation of disabled facilities at Black Tar. The feeling of the meeting was that, if a disabled toilet were to be installed at Llangwm, it should be in the toilets at Pill Parks Way. The County Council has now agreed to this. The Community Centre still does not have its own toilets, particularly children's toilets, and it is hoped to include this as part of the second stage of development—watch this space!

WANT TO BOOK THE COMMUNITY CENTRE?

As the Village Hall is now being used on a regular basis by a wide variety of groups and organisations, we would ask anyone wishing to book the hall, both existing and new users, to contact Pat Morris, our Booking Secretary. This is essential to ensure that the hall is available for your activity and to cover the hall for possible insurance claims. The procedure is simple:

- check the availability of the hall
- sign the booking form and attendant booking conditions
- pay prior to using the hall (conditions of our insurance)


Charges for using the hall are kept to an absolute minimum to ensure that it is available to any group or individual in the village. (Organisations external to the village are charged a premium rate!) We also ask all groups or individuals to leave the hall in the condition they would wish to find it as part of the standard booking arrangements.

WHAT NEXT?

Future activities in the pipeline include Keep Fit Classes (for the totally unfit!), Yoga sessions and various fund-raising events. We have a Village Hall to be proud of and we are delighted that it is now being used for the benefit of so many people in Llangwm.

LLANGWM GOES TRANSATLANTIC

Generously sponsored by Llangwm Community Council, Sam Wordsworth and I represented the UK this summer in the Atlantic Challenge in Rockland, Maine, USA.

We left for Maine on July 1st to endure an intensive two week training programme of rowing and sailing for up to twelve hours a day. (Possibly helped by the fact that drinking under the age of 21 is illegal and was the biggest

challenge of all!)

Our boat was the UK's *Integrite*, which has been moored on the Cleddau over this last winter. You may have noticed it under full sail or being rowed from time to time.

International Crews

Fourteen boats took part in the Challenge itself, representing countries from all over the world including Russia, Indonesia, USA, France, Ireland and Belgium. France and Ireland particularly have dedicated teams which train every day all year round and competition was strong. Even so, we came 5th!

An amazing experience

Everyone got on so well and the Americans were incredibly hospitable. The true feeling of the event took place on the last day when the sailing race was cancelled because of lack of wind. All the boats moored up together outside Rockland's one mile breakwater and, initiated by the UK team, commenced quite possibly the world's biggest water fight...

What next?

We're back, *Integrite* is back and ready for willing crews (no experience needed, age immaterial) to have the occasional session at £1 per head.

Meanwhile, Pembrokeshire's own boat is under construction, now, at MITEC in Milford and we have our eyes on some of Llangwm's most promising young rowers for the Challenge 2004—which may be held in Pembrokeshire!

Llangwm - past and present

Mr Jack Johns of Haverfordwest sends his greetings to Llangwm, where his roots lie. Both his grandfather and father were Llangwm men. Mr William Johns, his father, rowed to work at Pembroke Dock until he joined the Navy in 1902, seeing Active Service in both World Wars. He finally left the Navy at the end of World War II. Mr Jack John's cousin, Mrs Lizzie Roach, played the organ in the Wesleyan Chapel for 51 years.

In 'fair exchange', Mr Vernon Davies, originally from Haverfordwest, has lived in Llangwm since 1999. As a child, he lived with his grandmother at the Bakehouse on Salutation Square. He has a cornucopia of tales to tell about his early childhood and his hometown.

One memory is of his grandmother's threats: "If I was naughty or disobedient, as boys of that age often are, I would be threatened with 'Not you do that, for the Langums 'ull 'ave you'." But that was in the thirties. Now, after years of living away from Pembrokeshire, Mr Vernon Davies can hardly believe his luck—he is back once more in his home county.

Even as recently as October 1999, he thought, 'I'll never see Haverfordwest again', after a funeral had brought him into Pembrokeshire though not as far as Haverfordwest. The closest he got was the sign at Penblewin Roundabout.

But life is strange. Back in Cardiff, in the home he shared with his brother and sister-in-law, his brother said, "I've something to tell you..." The 'something' was the wish to live in Pembrokeshire, in Llangwm.

Mr Vernon Davies, ever cautious, said, "I'll have to think about that...right! I've thought! Yes!"

His grandmother's 'warnings' all those years ago seem to have come true—the 'Langums' do indeed 'ave 'im' but Mr Davies is quite content that this so.

News from Llangwm Community Council

Dangerous road junction under review

There have been many accidents at the junction of Nash/Deerlands Road, thankfully not fatal. The Community Council has, over the years, sought to improve the safety at this point. Two years ago, the County Council resited the speed restriction signs and it was hoped that this would improve the situation. However, accidents—or near accidents—still occur, many due to poor driving: the Community Council feel the situation could be improved.

Request for 'stop' sign refused

The Community Council suggested that the 'give way' sign on the Nash road be replaced by a 'stop' sign and rumble strips be introduced, as elsewhere in the district. The outcome of this request to the County Council is that they are prepared to site a larger 'give way' sign and improve the road markings. They are against the installation of a 'stop' sign or rumble strips. They report that they would only introduce rumble strips in areas of the highway where reported injuries or accidents have occurred.

Responding to the above, the Community Council is happy to accept clearer signs and markings to make drivers more aware of the junction but, in addition, request that a 'stop' sign be sited at this junction.

Waiting Restrictions

The requested restrictions to specific northerly parts of the Green and the junction with Pill Parks Way is still unanimously supported by the Community Council. The Council has been advised that the objection received by the County Council was not a true consensus of opinion in that certain residents in Pill Parks Way were not consulted on their views.

Joint Unitary Development Plan (JUDP)

Planning for the Kilns

The Development Plan produced by Pembrokeshire County Council and the Pembrokeshire Coast National Park proposed an extension to the village building boundary to include a section of land to the north of the Kilns. The JUDP was discussed at the June meeting of the Community Council. The meeting was reminded that the County council had wished to include the area in the previous development plan. This, however, had been rejected by two Planning Inspectors appointed by the Welsh Office, the latter following a second public inquiry in March 1997.

Cllrs Hardwick and Owens proposed a rejection of the plans to include the Kilns site for future development on the grounds of the Inspector's report.

Building for the Future?

A counter proposition by CIIr. Hitchings and Childs suggested Llangwm Community Council is not opposed to the Kilns development but would like to see an amendment added to the JUDP requesting the land is made available to young people from within the community.

Council voted 6 to 2 in favour of supporting the Kilns development with the stated proviso.



Concessionary Travel Pass Scheme

From 1 April 2002, a new concessionary fare scheme, funded by the Welsh Assembly and administered by all the local Authorities, was launched in Wales.

The new scheme entitles elderly people and people with disabilities resident in Wales to free travel on local bus services throughout Wales.

To apply, applicants must complete a form available from the Post Office. Applicants must be over 60 (women) or 65 (men) or registered disabled.

As from 1 April 2003, it is intended to revise the eligibility regulation and allow men aged 60 and over to qualify for free concessionary travel.
