

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



#### RECIPE FOR CAWL FOR 90 PEOPLE

Take one black plastic sack full of lamb bones and wet roast to make stock. Remove any fat from the stock when cold.

Remove meat and discard bones – yields approximately 5lbs meat.

Roast 3 boned shoulders of lamb and dice.

Peel and chop 40 large onions. Saute and place in large catering saucepan.

Peel and chop 50 large carrots, two-thirds of a net of

# COASTCARE FOR LLANGWM ESTUARY

Local beaches play a crucial role in the lives of coastal communities, whether for pastimes such as walking, fishing or water sports.

Unfortunately, much of Pembrokeshire's coastline is frequently disfigured with marine litter, which has the effect of reducing our enjoyment of the beaches and threatens wildlife.

Sadly, the walkable foreshore stretching from Black Tar to Edward's Pill to Guildford Pill, Llangwm Ferry and Port Lion, doesn't escape such disfigurement. Spring tides bring with its burgeoning swell of water unacceptable levels of unsightly and sometimes dangerous marine litter.

Now thanks to **Coastcare** the mechanism exists to remove the offending litter.

So what is **Coastcare**?

Coastcare is part of Keep Wales Tidy. Its principal aim is to get local people involved in the caring for their local environment, by promoting and supporting safe enjoyable conservation activities such as beach cleans, awareness raising and practical countryside tasks. A small grant may be made available to help cover the cost of insurance, project

materials, safety equipment and volunteer expenses.

**Coastcare** sets out to encourage groups of volunteers to 'adopt' their favourite stretch of coastline to focus on its on-going care.

Coastcare was piloted in Pembrokeshire and today there are 36 Coastcare groups operating in the county, the closest to us is the very active and successful Burton group.

**Coastcare** has already started in an unofficial capacity at Black Tar. On Monday, 10 January 2005, five of us picked up six bags of unsightly litter between the Vitling Rock and Edwards Pill and was efficiently removed by Pembrokeshire County Council on the very same day.

Now we wish to make **Coastcare** official in Llangwm. The proposal is for William Low, the local representative of **Keep Wales Tidy**, to elaborate on the objectives and strategies of **Coastcare**. This presentation has been arranged to take place in Llangwm Community Centre at 7.30 p.m. on the evening of Tuesday, 12 April. Everyone is welcome.

We have talked before with regard to the health benefits of the sport for the young and old alike. We will also try to accommodate any persons wishing to row or join the club who have any form of disability.

The club has recently held its Annual General Meeting and a new committee has now been formed. At this time also there is the reminder to existing members and those who wish to join the club that membership is now due. You will be glad to hear that there has been no increase in price from last year. All memberships are to be returned to the membership secretary, Rick Harold 01437 891938 by 15/03/05 if possible, this is to enable the boat insurance to be paid.

Please note that if you wish to have minutes of our meetings or notification of any forthcoming events or fund raising activities then please put your e mail address on your membership form. A family membership package including insurance for yourself and boats is £40, single rower is £30. This also includes use of all boats and equipment as often as you like. There are reduced rates for students, unemployed and senior citizens, this fee being £10. No specialist equipment is

needed, life jackets and coaching is provided free.

On the evening of Friday 29th April for those who are interested there is a planned row to Cresswell Quay to see how Morris is getting on with his fire water. This visit will probably be via the "Dog House" at Lawrenny to sample their wares as well. Anyone interested in this, whether it be rowing or in your own boat or craft, is welcome to attend. We will leave Black Tar no later than 7.30 pm weather (as always) permitting and return on the tide. (Probably won't care by then anyway.)

The Llangwm Regatta this year is on the 3<sup>rd</sup> July during the festival period and will be taking place in the afternoon starting around 3.30 pm at Black Tar. Anyone who may be able to help out this year can contact Bob Charles on 01437 891068 or any other committee member.

For those who will be rowing in the league this year a list of events is below. Always a warm welcome over there. Crews wishing to row the Return of the Cleddau Race on April 2<sup>nd</sup> please make yourselves known so we can allocate boats. (Always a popular one this.)

### **Community News**

### **BE SAFE, NOT SORRY**

Further to the visit made last year to the Community Council by Sgt Dave Perry of Dyfed Powys Police, we have been provided with booklets on safety and security, and are distributing these to all households in Llangwm with this issue of the Llangwm News.

Produced by the Home Office, the booklet 'Be Safe and Secure' covers all aspects of keeping safe - select from it what is relevant to your lifestyle, then, as they say on Crimewatch, sleep easy - crime is still a very small percentage of national life, and, thankfully, not a significant problem in our village.

### **RECYCLING POINT AT NASH ROAD**

A few months ago the Community Council was approached by Pembrokeshire County Council Waste Strategy/Highways and Environment Departments with a view to upgrading the recycling area at Nash Road lay-by.

Several schemes were put forward, within general design guidelines approved by the Welsh Assembly Government, who are committed to the principle of recycling - as indeed are the UK Government and the European Community.

Some 14 sites around Pembrokeshire were selected for an upgrade - you may have seen some around the county already completed, such as Narberth (an area of the Moor Car Park) and Pembroke (along the Commons, beneath the town wall). Welsh Assembly money has been made available for this, with a deadline of 30 March 2005.

A scheme was agreed upon which was felt to be the most fitting in the rural location of the lay-by, and work commenced during the last week of February. By the time this Newsletter reaches you, it will be completed, or near completion.

A bottle bank, can bank and paper bank will be provided, with the promise that there will be swift replacement for each one when full. It is hoped that this will make the recycling area much neater

and tidier, and all are encouraged to use it to the maximum, to make best use of recyclable materials.

As the children in the Welsh Assembly Government TV commercials put it – 'It's our future'.

### NO MORE DOG FOULING, PLEASE.

Rubbish of other sorts occasionally causes some consternation around the village. Please try to be aware of keeping rubbish bags tidy, always placed out in good time for collection, and preferably not the night before, as they provide great interest to cats, dogs, badgers and the like! Please also respect your public areas if you are disposing of household, garden or building waste.

Then, there is the perennial problem of dogs fouling the pavements and grassed areas around the village.

Even healthy dogs who are well cared for and regularly wormed can suffer from toxocara canis (roundworm), the larvae of which can cause serious eye damage if contracted by adults and children.

PLEASE BE VIGILANT AT ALL TIMES TO PREVENT YOUR DOG FROM FOULING THE PAVEMENT, GRASS VERGES AND IN PARTICULAR CHILDREN'S PLAY AREAS, SPORTS FIELDS AND PARKS. (It is especially loathsome on the rugby field, where players are tackled - remember that dogs are not allowed in Pill Parks.)

Because of the ongoing nuisance this causes around the whole village, the anti-social aspect of such behaviour, and the seriousness of the effect it can have on children's health, the Community Council are taking a strict line on irresponsible dog owners, AND ARE PREPARED TO PROSECUTE OFFENDERS.

Please be warned - we really want to have a clean and tidy village, for ourselves and others to enjoy.

For those of you who are responsible in the care of

your dog - and your community - there are informative and helpful hints on the internet. In particular we came across the website of Huntingdonshire District Council, which can be accessed on www.huntsdc.gov.uk. Go to the Environment and Planning section of their website, and seek out 'fido\_facts.pdf', an on-line leaflet and an A-Z of responsible dog ownership. It's excellent reading for all dog owners and dog lovers.

### WATERWAY FESTIVAL IS LAUNCHED

On a brighter note, several representatives attended the launch of the forthcoming 2005 Festival of the Waterway, coordinated by Planed and involving several local groups and communities.

A buffet lunch was recently held at the Ferry Inn, Llanstadwell, with BBC broadcaster Jamie Owen welcoming those who attended and giving a short presentation of the planned events.

That's something to look forward to in the summer right now, after the cold spells of winter, we hope that everyone will have an enjoyable Easter holiday, and make the most of the Pembrokeshire springtime, perhaps the best season of the year to explore this wonderful and varied county.

### HATHA YOGA

The Yoga Classes held in the Village Hall are going from strength to strength, with all three classes at near enough maximum capacity. There is a noticeable difference in everyone's posture, balance, coordination and flexibility! Well done, everyone!

Yoga is taught in six-week courses. The weekly programme for the first five sessions include a 15 minute attunement session (where everyone chills out); a 10 minute warm-up to gentle exercise; learning and practising 5 asanas (this is where movement and breathing work in harmony); and finally a 15-20 minute relaxation session when gentle snores resound. The sixth session is a revision time, when the asanas are written out and practised. This programme can then be used at home.

### N.B. The next course begins on Tuesday 5th April.

### Tips and Hints.

1. Getting in and out of the car.

Getting in - place your buttocks on the side and swivel round, bringing both legs into the car together. Getting out - reverse the process, swinging both legs out first.

Tired and aching back.

Lie flat on the floor in a straight position for 10 minutes, covering yourself with a blanket. This will help your muscles to relax.

3. Tired legs and aching feet.

Lie on your back with your buttocks about 20-30 centimetres away from the wall. Your body should be at right angles to the wall. Place your legs up the wall forming a slight V shape. Stay in this position for at least 10 minutes. This will help to ease both legs and feet.

### AWARD WINNING FARMER

Our very own 'Agricultural Correspondent' on 'Llangwm News', Will Scale of Great Nash Farm, Llangwm, was himself in the news recently when he was awarded second place in the prestigious new 'Silver Lapwing' Future of Farming Award.

Will's philosophy of farming is one of working in harmony with nature—farming not just for intensification and profit, but towards a more sustainable future for farming, conservation and the environment as a whole.

As Vice-Chairman of FWAG (the Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group) he works to convince farmers of the long-term need for change in this direction. The European-funded Tir Gofal scheme gives farmers incentives to grow crops which provide wildlife habitats - for example, a field of unsprayed spring wheat with a fallow boundary to encourage rare flowers, insects and birds; or a field of kale left for two years to provide food for small birds such as the linnet and the finch.

A Farm Walk was held last September at Great Nash, under the auspices of FWAG, to show representatives of the RSPB, Plant Line, the Countryside Council for Wales and local wildlife experts the benefits of the scheme.

The award was presented to Will at a ceremony in London in November by Baroness Young, chief executive of the Environment Agency, in the presence of leading figures in the UK farming world.

### FARM REPORT—by Will Scale

I don't think I could imagine farming without at least *some* sheep, despite the fact that it is becoming increasingly difficult to produce them cheaply. One problem is that lamb is seen as an expensive meat in comparison to, say, factory-farmed chickens.

Sheep are interesting creatures to observe. They can withstand very cold weather better than cows, pigs and hens, and with a thick coat that protects them from heat and cold, they thrive in fresh air and wind. Like

all animals though they dislike the rain and on really blustery rainy days you will find the flock huddled together miserably waiting for the rain to pass.

I cannot decide whether sheep are intelligent or stupid despite the oft-held view that they are somewhat dimthe best explanation I can give is that they have butterfly minds. They can have very long memories, for if we move sheep to a field they haven't visited for a while they will remember the gateways and favourite spots. Conversely they have a frustrating desire for launching themselves into tangled hedgerows and are then unable to escape until Dad or I armed with a pair of stout gloves separate them from the brambles or barbed wire; sometime it takes hours.

### SCOTTISH DANCING

LLANGWM SCOTTISH NOW LARGEST IN WALES

Following publicity for the Llangwm Scottish Country Dance Class in the last edition of the Llangwm News, more young people have joined the group and it is now the largest group in Wales catering for young people between six and sixteen!

Currently there are twelve youngsters, both boys and girls, who are members of the group and they meet on Wednesdays between 6 and 7.30pm, in the Community Centre. If numbers continue to increase, it is hoped that it will be possible to hold beginner sessions, as well as dancing at a higher grade for those who are more experienced. This will allow them to take their medal examination in Cardiff later in the year, in conjunction with the South Wales Branch of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society.

During the coming year, the young dancers could take part in the Folk Dance Festival to be held in Builth Wells in May, or dance at the Annual Festival organized by the South Wales Branch of the R.S.C.D.S., where more than 200 dancers from southern Wales and South West England have the unique experience of dancing in the Roman amphitheatre at Caerleon, on the same spot where hundreds of years previously, gladiatorial battles and Roman sporting contests took place.

#### TALES OUT OF SCHOOL

(snippets from the history of education in Llangwm)

From "On the state of education in Wales" 1851
"The school was held in the Wesleyan chapel. The schoolmaster was an infirm old man of seventy-five years of age. He had formerly been a farmer in the parish, but from adverse circumstances had taken to schoolkeeping for a maintenance. He received 2 shillings a week from the parish. The Rector of Llangwm informed me that there had been an intelligent woman keeping school in the Wesleyan chapel there about twelve months ago, but she had left. The old man formerly kept school in the Baptist chapel in the village, but, his daughter having had a dispute with minister, further permission to keep school in the chapel was refused to him. The villagers then wished the dame above mentioned to share the Wesleyan chapel with the old man as a schoolroom; but she refused and left the place."

From the School Logbook, June 1872 [ref: HPR/6/49] "David Lloyd allowed to go home in the afternoon, he having fallen into the river during the dinner hour."

From the School Logbook, November 1875 [ref: HPR/6/49] "First lesson in the afternoon not taken, through the neglect of the teachers in not getting the children in from the playground in proper time."

### From the School Managers' Minute Book, May 1910 [ref: HPR/6/50]

"It was resolved that all children living above an imaginary line drawn from Ashdale across to Ferry Point in the parish of Burton be excluded from the school, on account of want of accommodation consequent upon the new rule of the Board of Education, which requires that 10 square feet be allowed for each child."



### From a letter written by Rev. T. Williams of Llangwm, December 1868 [ref: HPR/6/52]

"The Court of Chancery has also consented to sell a fitting site [for a school in Llangwm] for ten pounds as a nominal consideration. A gentleman interested in the project has consented to pay this sum...... The site is that of a cottage now out of repair and garden surrounding it just outside the village and will furnish sufficient space for a school house, yard, master's house and garden, all in contiguity."

From the "Duties of Cleaners" 1912 [ref: HPR/6/57] "All fires must be lit at least half an hour before the time for opening school and before dusting."

### From HMI report on Llangwm School, 1927 [ref: HPR6/63] "The drab interior of the School with its dusty and patchy walls

and ceiling, together with a dirty floor and a lumber of broken furniture and dust-covered, tattered wall illustrations piled in one corner of the main room..... managers and staff should cooperate to provide a more congenial environment."

#### A WEALTH OF WILDLIFE

It cannot escape anyone's notice that the extremely mild weather we are currently experiencing is resulting in early flowering for many wild and garden plants. We have had primroses flowering in our garden since mid-December and a blackthorn tree behind the house started flowering in mid-January. It makes you think that soon the seasons will be indistinguishable.

For anybody with even just a passing interest in birds there is no better place than Llangwm to indulge in that interest. Just read what **Graham Stephens** of Llangwm Ferry has to say....

When we moved back to Llangwm Ferry some thirteen years ago, a visiting friend made the comment, "It's very nice but it's a shame the tide isn't in all the time; all that mud is so unattractive". I resisted the temptation to say what I was thinking and just bit my tongue. She had clearly missed the point. The constant ebb and flow of the tides and the everchanging light and mood of the river make for endless variations in the scenery. Couple this with the woodland, farmland and gardens that surround and intertwine with the village and we also have a variety of habitats to rival most other places in the U.K. Little wonder then that the bird life we see on a daily basis is so varied. We tend to take it for granted but last November something moved me to actually count the number of bird species I could see in one day without ever leaving the confines of my own garden. The results were amazing; a total of thirty-three species and no cheating!

The following comprises the bird species observed for Sunday, 21st November 2004. I've split them into 'Estuary' and 'Garden / Field' locations:

There are of course many more species that can be seen both in the garden and on the mudflats. It's just that on that particular day I didn't happen to spot them. Coal Tits and Greenfinches are regular visitors to the bird table but on Sunday 21st November, they'd clearly decided to dine elsewhere or I simply wasn't watching when they turned up. It would be interesting to repeat the survey at different times of the year and also from one year to another. Certainly some species seem to have declined in recent years. Marsh Tits used to be quite common on the bird table but I haven't seen any for some time. Starling numbers are well down on previous years and Bullfinches have just disappeared. Conversely, the pair of Nuthatches that visit the table each day, although not rarities, are newcomers to this particular garden.

Perhaps a co-ordinated species / numbers count might provide interesting results from across the whole village. If anyone is interested in conducting a survey in the Spring - let's say on Sunday, April 3rd, with each person giving a village location and approximate numbers of a particular species seen at any one time, I would be happy to process the results and feed them back in a future newsletter.

#### **Graham Stephens**

The RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch was held on the 29th/30th January and once again the more exotic visitors to our garden like the Treecreeper, Nuthatch and Greater Spotted Woodpecker decided to stay away!

Over the last few months, the pills and shoreline have sustained large numbers of over-wintering waterfowl and waders including Canada Geese, Teal, Mallard, Shelduck (71on the 18th January), Egrets, Lapwings, Dunlin, Redshank, one or two Greenshanks and occasional Ringed Plover, Great Crested and Little Grebes.

On 15th December, Dr John Taverner from his house overlooking the Pill in Guildford heard a racket caused by numerous gulls and rooks. They were mobbing a male Peregrine which was trying to recover the body of its kill floating in the water. After several attempts, showing itself well, it picked up the body of a Lapwing and flew off towards Llangwm ferry with gulls in hot pursuit.

On opening her curtains one morning in January at Black Tar, Gill Bowen was treated to a view of a Kingfisher standing in all its glory on her garden wall above the shore.

Juan Brown, the warden of Skomer Island Nature Reserve has once again been 'overwintering' in Llangwm and his garden in Guildford was visited on three occasions in December by Blackcaps (warblers which are normally summer visitors). He also recorded a Spotted Redshank in the Pill on 20 December (with beautiful photographs to prove it) and again on 2 January and 18 February...a Mediterranean Gull on 21January (also in the Pill) and a Barn Owl overflying his house in early February.

Mervyn Jones had a real treat around midday on the 28th January when he spotted a Little Gull (in first winter plumage) off the Cunnigar. One had been reported at an earlier date at Carew so this may have been the same individual.

> Conspicuously the world¹s smallest gull, it is seen very infrequently around these parts in the winter and it breeds in northeast Europe and Russia.

Once again Chiffchaffs have been overwintering at the sewage works at Port Lion.
