

SEAFAIR SUCCESS

The months of planning and preparation that preceded the **Seafair Haven** event paid off handsomely. Having been selected as host port to the gig, drascombe, skiff and longboat categories, a party atmosphere prevailed at **Black Tar** during the last week of June helped by favourable weather.

What a wonderful sight as the small fleet of gigs and their crews from Brittany, Ireland and the UK, drascombes, Thames skiffs, an Irish curragh and even a miniature **Viking longboat** put ashore on the evening high tide on Sunday 25 June.



Awaiting them was a warm welcome from a large crowd of villagers, a reception and drinks in the garden of Quay House, a well arranged campsite and a marquee with a well stocked bar and great live music – folk songs, sea shanties and dancing to the *Carreg Las Ceilidh Band*.

The Bretons entertained us with their songs and it was memorable seeing a Breton piper playing his bagpipes at the top of the shore with his compatriots performing a traditional dance around him.



The week progressed with well programmed river 'raids', the crews exploring the upper and lower reaches of the **Cleddau** during the day, from **Lawrenny** and **Pembroke** to **Angle** and **Dale**, and enjoying more Llangwm hospitality in the evenings.

With the last minute withdrawal of the planned caterer, Ian and Christine Jacob bravely stepped into the breach by offering their facilities at Quay House, and a rota of

volunteers fed the crew members under an awning and on the verandah in considerable style.

Memorable moments from the marquee included Mrs Margaret Watkins leading the French visitors in a rousing version of the 'Marseillaise' (French national anthem), as well as Wednesday's band, Alan Coy & Co, ending their set in spectacular fashion by firing a cannon that succeeded in plunging the entire site into temporary darkness by blowing a fuse!



Black Tar was the perfect venue for such an event and the hospitality shown by the village was the talk of the harbour-wide SeaFair event. There is no doubt that if the event is held again in the haven in two years time Llangwm will feature strongly in the proceedings.

It was always intended that any profit from the event would benefit the village. The Bar was manned by members of the Rugby and Cricket Club and showed a profit of £3,500 which will contribute to the eventual refurbishment of the shower and changing facilities at Pill Parks.

The modest profit from other activities like the campsite will be shared among the other village organisations that had contributed to the event





Stephen bowls them over!

Congratulations go to Llangwm's Stephen Inward who is the first Welsh cricketer ever chosen to represent England at under-15 level against both Scotland under-17s and Barbados under-16s at Loughborough. Stephen recently received his England cap from Ian Blackwell, the England and Somerset player.

Selectors chose Stephen after he scored 72 not out for the West of England in the West Indies, and when he scored 63 and 64 in the opening fixtures of the Bunbury Festival in Sussex.

He has also scored impressive centuries (140,125 and 114) for Llangwm in league fixtures, and last season scored 102 for Wales against Millfield School.

His dad Martyn is a former pace bowler for Llangwm, his brother Chris plays cricket for Llangwm - and his mum Tina plays for the Llangwm ladies' team.





The children's competition, which will also be held each year, is for children throughout the whole diocese.

The Court Of Great Sessions - Sesiwn Fawr

Some members of Llangwm Local History Group joined with Dyfed Family History Society for an annual trip to the National Library of Wales, Aberystwyth. The main focus of the day was to research family history, but interesting things are uncovered sometimes, purely by chance. The following are six extracts from the Court of Great Session for the years 1745 to 1818, and most of the offences took place in Llangwm.

1745 David Griffith, a yeoman of Llangwm, was accused of Assault (including wounding but not malicious wounding) on 10th August 1745. He was prosecuted by his victim - William Crunn, a tailor of Llangwm. There is no other information recorded as to his fate.

1760 John David, a miller of Llangwm, was accused of Assault (including wounding but not malicious wounding) on the 19th of January 1760. The offence took place in Burton, and his victim was William Llewhelin. Although he pleaded Not Guilty, he was fined 6d (approximately 2p in today's money).

1770 John Philips, a Cooper from Llangwm, was accused of Murder (including aiding and abetting and accessory to murder). The Murder of Williams Stephens, also of Llangwm, by beating him, took place on the 10th of June. The victim's relative, Griffith Stephens prosecuted, and although John Philips pleaded Not Guilty, a verdict of Manslaughter was reached. (No information given on the sentence, but he was probably transported for life, as hanging was reserved for a Murder charge)

1801 Mary Lawrence, a married woman aged 50 of Llangwm, was accused of "breaking and entering mainly houses but also shops, workshops, mills etc." She was accused that on the 14th March, 1801, she broke in and entered "the prosecutor's house and stole wearing apparel, cloth, wheat and Japan cannister"; all valued at £1 18 shillings. She was prosecuted by Margaret Jones, a spinster of Lambston. Although Mary pleaded Not Guilty, she was found guilt of grand larceny, a partial verdict, and transported for 7 years 1812 John Menzies (alias Thomas Menzies), a hawker of Llangwm, was accused of miscellaneous offences that took place in Llangwm. His crimes read as follows "Bargaining for money - guineas, and offering more than their current worth" for preventing the current gold coin of the realm being paid or accepted for a greater value than the current value of such coin; for preventing any note or bill....of the Bank of England....being received for any smaller sum than the sum thereby specified" The indictment refers to Haverfordwest Bank notes. The offences were committed on the 17th June 1812, and the prosecutor was Mark Davies, a Customs Officer of Llangwm. John Menzies pleaded Not Guilty, and the verdict found in his favour - Not Guilty. N.B. It would be interesting if anyone could explain the above charge 1818 James James, a Labourer from Llangwm, was accused of the theft of a sheep, valued at £3. The prosecutor was George Whittow, a farmer from Llangwm. The incident was said to have taken place on the 17th of March, 1818. James gave a Not Guilty plea, and the verdict was "No true bill". (Does this mean not proven?)

1818 Also accused of a similar offence, and on the same date was Mary Thomas a 'singlewoman'. Her crime was noted as sheep-stealing (including the killing of a sheep with intent to steal carcass and aiding and abetting). George Whittow was again the prosecutor, and the verdict was "no true bill"

The Really Wild Page!

SPRING and SUMMER WILDLIFE by Graham Brace

Birdwise, it was quite an eventful Spring. One male and four female **redpolls** were feeding on Niger seeds in the garden of Woodcote at The Gail on 16 March.

There seemed to be more than the usual sightings of **siskins** in gardens around the village throughout March and April and Jan Billen caught a pair on camera feeding on nuts in her garden on 29 April.

The first swallows arrived on 28 March and Val John spotted a swift on 4 April.

It was also quite a Spring for raptor sightings. On 18 March I saw a **red kite** flying leisurely over Ferry Hill in a northerly direction and it was also seen shortly afterwards by Mervyn and Sue Hopkins being mobbed by rooks over Knapp. At midday on 9 April Graham Stephens saw two **red kites** passing northwards over Llangwm Ferry whilst much higher up was a very large bird of prey that Graham is convinced (having seen them frequently in Europe) was an **eagle**. He was unable to identify the species. This individual was undoubtedly passing through.

Also on 9 April Mervyn Jones was lucky enough to see an **osprey** take a fish off Black Tar. He saw (almost certainly) the same bird at Sprinkle Pill the following day.

The Pill as usual was virtually devoid of shore and waterbirds through much of April, May and June apart from half a dozen non-breeding mallards. Our **spotted redshank** was last seen on 4 April and in the same week the overwintering **teal** departed, followed by the **common redshank** and **little egrets**.


Along with the **black-headed gulls**, the **redshanks** and an **egret** re-appeared in the first week of July and their numbers have steadily increased since. There were 13 **dunlin** in summer plumage (black bellies) feeding on the waterline on the Cunnigar on 19 July accompanied by one **whimbrel**. The first **teal** (a female) was seen on 5 August.

On 7 August there were 7 **little egrets** in the Pill. Two were feeding in the channel beneath Ferry Hill and 5 were wading in a 30-yard stretch of the stream just below the ford in Guildford. There is no doubt that these stunning birds are increasing in numbers on the waterway but I still have no knowledge of them breeding locally.

At the time of writing (late August) the **spotted redshank** has still failed to return. Perhaps it has gone to other shores or met with its demise on its travels to the far north to breed.

Finally, the insect world. Carol Lovey reported seeing a **hummingbird hawk moth** in her garden on 15 August. These rare visitors to Pembrokeshire fly by day and are easy to identify because of the hummingbird-like way they hover around blossom in the garden whilst extracting nectar with a long proboscis.

For anyone interested in learning to identify shore birds (and others) from a real expert, join John Wyatt on a walk around Fowborough Point and Sprinkle Pill on Sunday 5 November. Meet at Underwood at 11.00am, with wellies and binoculars. John gave a most interesting talk and slide show back in July. (See also the report on John's talk and slide show in the History (and Natural History) Society report on page 13.)

This will enable the Society to buy their own display boards (much needed, as we have begged and borrowed them each year up to now) and to copy and produce reference material in a presentable fashion. This is a great boon, and we hope it will benefit all who come to our exhibitions in the future. Many thanks, gardeners!

We are frequently asked for archive material – e.g. for **Jamie Owen's** travel programmes and recently for **Trevor Fishlock**, who spent an enjoyable day in Llangwm, interviewing Jeff James and filming in his **museum**.



It seems researchers contact us first and foremost via the **Llangwm website**, and we are also grateful to John Ewart for the website's fine picture gallery of photographs old and new, in a stunning new presentation.

We hope you saw and enjoyed our Festival Exhibition which dealt mainly with 'The River', but also included a cleverly programmed 'Then and Now' DVD. Also on display was the touching autobiography of Raymond Palmer, handwritten for his grandson Jonathon, and loaned by his widow Dorothy, of Ashdale Lane, Llangwm. Richard Palmer of Deerland was kind enough to lend the Society a much-prized print of Kirkland, the Llangwm racehorse which won the Grand National in 1905. Many thanks to the Methodist Chapel for allowing us to hold the exhibition there.

In May we visited Great Nash Farm, with its medieval and modern buildings, and took a look at environmental farming and the meadowland that had been re-created. Thanks to Will Scale who researched and presented the farm's history so well, and gave us an unforgettable tour of the listed Dovecote, inside and out.

In **June** our planned evening at Castle Pill fell through so we went instead to **Templeton**, to marvel at the huge fascinating collection of domestic, industrial and mechanical items belonging to **Peter Thomas** (of **Kilgetty Christmas Lights** fame). Another unforgettable outing.

On 29 **July** some members visited the newly restored dovecote and garden at Rosemarket, comparing and contrasting it with the one at Nash Farm (see above).

Llangwm in the 18th century

In the Pembrokeshire Record Office at Haverfordwest Castle, there is a lease dated 2nd February 1704 that granted a right of way from Great Nash farm to Black Tar "for all carts, wagons and other carriages with cattle to drive, lead and carry all and all manner of coal, culm, lime and other goods" belonging to Charles and Dorothy Owen.

Basically, the route is described as follows: -

"From Pitt Park eastward across several fields belonging to Sir Richard Walter of Shenfield, Essex, to Moorhead and from there to a place called David Gwynn's Short Leys by Long Row Hedge. Then straight as near as possible eastward leaving the two old sheep cotes (one on each side of the way leading north and south called the Churchway from Hook to Llangwm) on the south side to the open and large field called South Knap and continuing eastward through South Knap field to a place called Black Tar Rock."

The right of way was described as being 18 feet wide. The document also states that the lime kiln was at the east end of South Knap field.

Can you work out the route? [No prizes for the best effort!]

Dogged Determination!

How well do you know Helen Carrington? Read on to find out more!

(Hopefully this will be the first in a series of profiles of people in Llangwm—see message from the editors on page 16).

Helen Carrington's first day as a dog warden was certainly one to remember. Her colleague got attacked by a vicious stray, and they ended up spending all day in casualty. But the experience certainly hasn't given her paws...for thought! (don't worry, that's the only pun).

"It's brilliant – no two days are the same," said Helen.
"Yesterday we were out patrolling the Blue Flag beaches –
that was great." It's a hard life!

Helen, from Gail Rise, started working as a dog warden for Pembrokeshire County Council in early July. But her experience with dogs goes back a long way. For the last five years, she has instructed in dog training at Barn Lake kennels, established Llangwm's annual Dog Show at Picnic in the Park – and set up her own one-to-one business, K9 Capers.

Not only that – she's mother to Emily, 9, and Thomas, 6, who go to Llangwm School and wife to John, a haulage contractor for A.J. Carrington and Sons (who Thomas describes as working 'more than full-time!').

She's got two dogs (Dudley and Poppy), four cats and she's worked on the festival committee for several years. Not much to pack in then!

She has had a lifelong love of dogs, being given her first one at the age of 10, a collie cross called Basil. At the age of 17, she started working at Barn Lake kennels, and stayed there for two years before moving to Haverfordwest Pet Centre. She believes this background has really helped her with dog training. "We always had dogs around when we were growing up, so I'm very used to them," she said. "You can tell what a dog is feeling by watching its body language, and you can only learn that over time." "But I think to really understand them, you need intuition, and that's just something that you're born with."

After her daughter was born, Helen worked on a regular basis at Barn Lake and got into instructing some five years ago. "It's basically instructing people how to teach their own dog, from the basic sit to more complex things like directional instructions," she said. "The most common things owners want is for their dog to stop pulling on the lead, recall, and stop them jumping up. They're very easy things to sort out."

Helen has seen all sorts of dogs in the Llangwm Dog Show – now a popular annual event at Picnic in the Park. She set up the show after she joined the Festival Committee. "I thought it would be a nice idea to get everyone together, as a lot of people have got dogs in the village; and it was also a way to raise funds. It's grown from there really." The first year, there were 40 dogs and this year, there were nearly 100 from all over Pembrokeshire.

Helen said one of the most enjoyable aspects are the child handling classes. "The children make so much effort and they're very good, and that's really encouraging as they are the dog owners of the future," she said.

She has also advised on dog instruction on the James Wellbeloved stand at **Crufts**, and given 'clicker' demonstrations with Poppy. She has shown both Poppy and Dudley at Crufts, and Poppy was recently awarded Best Puppy in the Parson Russell Terrier Championship in Worcester.

But if Helen has one pet hate, it's – perhaps unsurprisingly – dog fouling. "There's a certain few who don't pick up after the dogs, and it reflects badly on everyone else," she said.

It's just so unnecessary." So - if you don't already - take a poop bag out with your pooch or Helen will not be impressed. Don't forget she's a dog warden with powers to impose a £75 on-the-spot fine. Ouch!
