






Rain fails to dampen Llangwm's 2007 Festival

This summer may prove to be one of the wettest on record, but it failed to dampen the enthusiasm of Llangwm's villagers to enjoy their festival.

Earlier this year both the **Festival Committee** and the **Pill Parks Grandstand Redevelopment Group** came up with an ambitious plan to work together and raise funds to refurbish the 40 year old rugby and cricket club stand. Both groups were planning to step into the unknown and unfamiliar.

We planned to erect a marquee on the rugby field during the festival and to lay on a series of events that would draw a significant number of people in, not just to see a good show, but also to spend money while there. Big questions arose...What sort of show would draw people in? Would the tickets sell? Could the marquee be filled every single night? As it happened all the shows sold out.

The opening evening was a stand up comedy show, supported by the Welsh Arts Council. The following night offered a free Ceilidh, then a brilliantly funny Poems and Pints night, and on the Sunday everyone could enjoy a roast beef salad to the sounds of 'Jazzin Around'. The marquee events finished off with Llangwm's three churches joined together for a Songs of Praise accompanied by the Pembroke Town Band.



Other events were taking place all over the village. The Methodist Chapel opened every day offering their special teas; the village hall hosted an Arts & Crafts exhibition and a series of craft workshops by staff from **Pembrokeshire College**. St. Jerome's Church made its contribution by providing a patchwork exhibition and on two evenings presented sell out concerts, The first featured songs and sonnets from Tudor times and on July 4th the **Landsker Singers** performed a concert of songs by American composers.



Surprisingly, the sun came out for the carnival and fete.

Stephen Crabb MP crowned the Carnival King, Toby Asson and Queen Sian Roach. The Fairy King was George James and Fairy Queen Tamsin Davies, attendants were Rose Sinclair James and Lily Thomas.



The 2007 festival turned out to be a great success and it proved that when a community comes together with a determination to succeed, even a seemingly impossible goal can be achieved.

Radio & TV Presenter **Chris Serle** took on the task of judging the festival scarecrow entries.



"They were extremely difficult to judge," he said before presenting the awards. "The standard is high and I am impressed at the originality of some of the ideas. It's obvious that a lot of effort was put in by everyone." This year's main theme was Cartoon Characters and the class attracted a lot of entries. 
The festival drew to its close, as it had opened, with a party at the Cottage Inn, with music provided by Riptide.



'The Ladies No 1 Detective Agency' by Alexander McCall Smith.

Set in Botswana it tells of Mma Ramotswe a 'traditionally built' African lady who sets up her own detective agency. 

From the Archives...

House for sale?

Advertisements of houses for sale are a relatively recent innovation in local newspapers and it was not until the early 1970s that newspaper adverts really started to feature photos and prices. During the first half of the 20th century, many properties were sold to sitting tenants (as they were gradually sold off by the large estates such as those belonging to the **Scourfield** and **Lort-Phillips** families in Llangwm) or they were sold at auction.

In 1911, 'Millbrook House' (off Main Street) was sold for £46 but, by 1952, it was on the market for £1,000. In 1914, cottages on the Scourfield estate in the Guilford area were being sold to their sitting tenants for between £35 and £100 and 'Butterhill' was valued at £450.

The sale of 'Mill House' for £250 in 1928 was not completed – due to the death of the purchaser – and it was eventually sold in 1949 for £260. Further up Mill Street, 'Trindall House' (no. 6) was sold in 1962 for £1,600.

Great Nash farm was valued at £5,500 in 1933 whilst The Kilns farm was sold for £1,500 in 1923. In the 1960s, The Kilns (without the farmland, I believe) was on the market for £600.

In 1964, a plot of land adjacent to 'Black Tar Cottage' was bought for £320 and the purchaser of a property at Edward's Pill had to take out a mortgage for £600. In 1976, 'Black Tar Cottage' was up for sale at £13,500 while, in Port Lion, 'Apple Tree Cottage' was on the market for £13,750.

Number 30 Gail Rise was put up for sale at £32,500 in 1985 – and number 12 ('Ty Gwyn') had recently been advertised at £28,750 in the window of R K Lucas. In 1986, a modern detached architect-designed house in Port Lion would have set you back a massive £62,000.

'Wynbrae' (in Main Street) was purchased by its tenant in 1911 for £40. By 1954, it was changing hands for £600, in 1962 for £750 and then, in 1963, for £700. Since then, in common with other properties in the village and elsewhere, the market value has increased rapidly - £15,500 in 1983, £19,000 in 1986, £40,000 in 1993 and £90,000 in 2004.

Information on house prices can be found in the records of solicitors, estate agents, land agents and valuers as well as in the local newspapers.

The Llangwm Local History Society has recently received a grant of £974.79 from the Sustainable Pembrokeshire Small Grants Scheme run by PAVS (Pembrokeshire Association of Voluntary Services). This grant has enabled us to purchase display boards, which were used in the recent exhibition held in the Methodist Chapel, a storage cupboard and other equipment, stationery etc. The boards and cupboard will be housed in the Village Hall and will enable the Society to consolidate and augment the local historical archive for the benefit of the whole community. The display boards will also be available for use by any other organisation in the village.

The aim of the Archive Project is to increase the amount and variety of documents and photographs relating to **Llangwm** and the Local History Society would be delighted to copy any items in order to augment its records. We are constantly trying to enlarge the archive and would be grateful for any assistance in this area. April saw a large group from the Society make a memorable visit to the **Pembroke Gun Tower**. This fascinating defensive tower was like the tardis – far larger on the inside than it looks from the outside. We were given a very instructive and entertaining talk by the volunteers who run the tower, about its construction, purposes and life inside! The Society was even able to add to their knowledge as one member could identify the guns on the 'top deck' as being made in the Crawshay Ironworks in Merthyr Tydfil. It is well worth a visit if you have never been.

Following on from her interesting talk on different types of **old handwriting**, Claire Orr, the Archivist from the Records Office, made a return visit to give the Society members a go at reading **old documents**. She brought along different documents relating to Llangwm which gave everyone a good deal of practice in deciphering types of handwriting. This should prove of great use for anyone who is researching their own family history and also as we start to research and augment our own local history archive.

Our final visit took place in June and carries on from our environmental remit. Ever willing to try something new, about 30 members climbed aboard Will Scale's trailer to be taken around Great Nash Farm and learn about his methods of farming. For those of us who drive past farms and are only slightly aware of what actually goes on, this proved fascinating – and we were even lucky with the weather. Will explained about his experiments with growing crops using a no ploughing system, the different environmental projects he is undertaking, set aside and his new pigs. We also explored the site of the old mill and saw a wonderful range of birds which can be seen on farmland and not usually in gardens. We are very grateful to Will for welcoming us for a second time to Great Nash Farm.

The Local History Society events will start again on 12th September.

Gough Edwards of *Langum* - "The Best Headmaster in London"

Recent visitors to Llangwm during May were two noted authors: Hilary Devonshire and Henry Pluckrose, from London. This was not their first visit as Hilary is working on her family tree with its roots in Llangwm; she is a descendant of the "Edwards" family of Chapel Row. Hilary's grandfather was **Gough Edwards** who was a brother of Martha Edwards, who later became the wife of Alderman James John J.P. of Chapel Row. Gough Edwards was a former pupil of Llangwm School and went on to become a B.Sc. (Honours) of London University and Licentiate of the College of Preceptors.



He was appointed to the headship of several London Schools, the last being Norwood Central (Carnac Street) L.C.C., where he was the headmaster for ten years before his unexpected death, while preparing to leave for school in the morning. He was aged 57 years.

The esteem in which he was held was evident from the newspaper reports at the time, one of which stated "Best Headmaster in London". Another reported "Through his encouragement, many of his old students have secured the highest awards in London Chamber of Commerce, Pitman's and the Society of Arts Examinations and the demand for Norwood Central students was great."

He had a brother, James Edwards, who was also a London Headmaster. Hilary was accompanied by Henry Pluckrose, the author of approximately 250 educational published titles (which have been published in some seven languages).



When they visited Llangwm School, they were warmly welcomed by the Headmaster Nick Groves. During the visit Mr Groves was able to produce a log book relating to the time that Gough Edwards was a pupil, much to the surprise of Hilary.

Both Hilary and Henry wish to thank Mr Groves for his efforts on their behalf. It was very much appreciated.

Wildlife Notes

SPRING AND SUMMER

Spring and summer arrived early and ended prematurely in early May when the prolonged wet spell began. The beautiful weather in March may well have caused the early exodus to breeding grounds of all the over-wintering wildfowl and waders from the Pill by 31st March...a good week earlier than last year.

During March a *spotted redshank* was present on numerous occasions before departing to breed. For long periods during April, May and June the Pill was completely devoid of water birds apart from a few gulls, the odd shelduck, a couple of non-breeding mallards and the occasional curlew and little egret (egrets are generally absent for most of April, May and June). Three *whimbrel* stopped over for a few days in mid-May and, unusually for the time of year, I saw a flock of 36 *dunlin* resplendent in summer plumage (black belly patches) feeding at the water's edge on the Cunnigar on 28th May. Occasionally taking flight, their underparts flashed brilliant white in the sunshine as they turned in split second unison this way and that.

A month later, on 28th June, the *common redshanks* returned and there were 14 present in the Pill together with a couple of *black headed gulls...* almost two weeks earlier than last year. The numbers of both these birds increased steadily over the following weeks with 36 redshanks present and in excess of 60 noisy black headed gulls at the end of July, by which time most had moulted out their distinctive black heads.

It was good to hear the *Canada geese* again after their spring and summer absence from the shores around Llangwm. I heard them early on 27th July and again taking off from the Pill in two groups of about twenty on 30th July. On 7th August there were 43 Canada geese and 3 *barnacle geese* present. On the afternoon of 20th August a flock of around 500 geese including 2 *snow geese* and 3 barnacle geese were resting and feeding on the mudflats at Ferry Point!

On the afternoon of 5th August while I was returning along the shore from Port Lion, a dog on the Cunnigar opposite disturbed 7 *little egrets* which took off and flew down river. On rounding Ferry Point a group of people further up the Pill caused another 6 to take flight from the gully under Ferry Hill. I have never known 13 little egrets to be present in the Pill together, although I have seen as many as 23 resting in a tree near Sprinkle. These beautiful and spectacular birds are obviously continuing to thrive and increase locally as they are elsewhere around the southern British and Irish coasts, extending their range northwards year on year.

There have been some notable raptor sightings since my last report. Bryn Bevan saw a *red kite* over Deerland on 14 March and Ian Jacob spotted two *ospreys* passing upriver at Black Tar on 26 March.

Dave Walters was alerted by an agitated and very noisy gang of jackdaws and rooks in Williamston Terrace on 9 April. On further investigation he discovered the cause was a female *sparrowhawk* being unceremoniously pinned to the road surface by a large rook on its back. It had obviously posed a threat to the very young crows in the trees (and chimneys) nearby, and had been mobbed and overwhelmed by the adult crows. Dave's arrival on the scene undoubtedly saved the sparrowhawk from injury (and possibly worse!) and it managed to escape.

Walking along the shore at high tide early in the morning of 22^{nd} March a noisy rabble of gulls wheeling about off Rectory Point drew my attention to a *Grey Seal* cow eating a large (unidentified) fish. Having swallowed it, the seal submerged only to surface again at intervals until it reached the top end of the Pill between Orchard Row and the Stepping Stones. This caused great excitement to a couple of workmen feeding the swans on the Guildford side. Perhaps it had been following the herrings upstream from Milford and the open sea.

After an absence of some 8 months there are once again signs of *otter* activity around Llangwm with fresh spraints being deposited at the 3 sprainting sites around the shore during the first week of August. The Pembrokeshire Otter Survey has resumed for another 12 month period and I'm collecting the spraints for analysis at Swansea University.

On one of the rare occasions recently when we opened the parasol over our patio table I was surprised to find attached to the underside what appeared to be a rolled, green cigar about 3 inches long. It was, in fact, the nest/egg chamber of a *leaf cutter bee*. This solitary bee builds its nest from small oval tiles of rose leaf about a half inch long which it cuts with its jaws and carries back to the nest site between its legs before gluing it into place on the structure with saliva. It lays its solitary egg in a chamber at one end which it then fills with honey and seals up with a firm wax. Usually the leaf cutter bee builds its nest in a bank, wall crevice or hollow tree or plant stem.

We've had an amusing battle of wits with a *grey squirrel* in our garden over supremacy of the bird feeder (containing peanuts) hanging in our crab apple tree. To begin with it sussed out how to remove the top to get at the peanuts which I then secured with thick wire. It unwound it and removed the top. I rewired it more securely. Then it worked out that if it unhooked it from the branch the bottom would fall out when it crashed to the ground. So I wired up the bottom and secured the hook firmly to the branch. It then with great determination and diligence gnawed its way through the (substantial) wire mesh containing the nuts. I patched it with intricately woven wire. It unwound it. I patched it up again. It unwound it again and for good measure gnawed a fresh hole on the other side. I gave up!

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
