





The Llangwm Gardening Club meets in **The Cottage Inn in Llangwm, at 7.30pm**, on the first Monday of the month.


All are welcome, not only Llangwm residents, but all the local area - come and join us if you like gardens and gardening and a sociable evening.

children have settled very
well into the summer term
and there continues to be
a positive and hardworking
atmosphere within each of
our eight classes.

The New Cleddau Reach School Building

Work on the new Cleddau Reach School building began in November 2011. The contract for the construction of the new school was awarded to Dawnus Construction. It is anticipated that the building will be completed and operational during the spring term 2013.

Members of the School Council joined the Working Party of the Governing Body on their recent visit to the construction site. The children and governors were able to meet the site manager and ask a range of questions linked to the timetable for the project. They were also able to view the current work.

Celebrating and Remembering Llangwm V.C. Primary School 1871-2010

This term the children and staff at the Llangwm Base of the school will be working hard to produce material that records and celebrates the long history of Llangwm VC Primary School. The aim is to create an interactive DVD and to make this available for purchase within the local communities.

The school will be holding an Open Afternoon on Thursday 24th May starting at 1.30pm. During that afternoon we would be delighted to see anybody who would be willing to share their memories of either attending or working in the school. There will be a display of photographs, school log books and other materials linked to the history of Llangwm School. There will also be a cup of tea and a cake for all who attend!

If you are able to attend the afternoon could you please inform the school secretary Mrs. Jane Brock on 01437 890528. If you unable to attend that afternoon but are able to come in on another occasion please let Mrs Brock know so that we can arrange a mutually agreeable time.

If anybody is unable to visit the school but would be willing to write down their memories we would be very pleased to receive them in school.

We are also very keen to discover any early photographs or illustrations of the school. At present we have many photographs from 1960 onwards but I was hoping that there might be some from before that time. If you are able to help please contact the school so that we can make copies.

There are so many characters and stories linked to the history of the school and now, before the move into the new school building, would be a wonderful opportunity to preserve them.

At the school we hope to have gathered all the interviews, photographs and information by the end of June. The aim is to have the interactive Llangwm VC Primary DVD available shortly before the school breaks up for the summer holidays.

Cleddau Reach the First Primary School in Wales to achieve the Healthy Workplace Award

Cleddau Reach VC Primary
School has been congratulated
for being the first primary
school in Wales to attain the
Small Workplace Health Award.
The award is given to employers
who demonstrate that they
invest in the health and safety
of their staff, and address
particular health issues in
the workplace.



Mary Macdonald, Healthy
Schools Co-ordinator with the
Pembrokeshire Public Health
Team, praised the school, saying:
"I am proud of the success and
achievement gained by the
school, which reflects the hard
work and dedication to improving
the health of the whole school
community."

"As you would expect, promoting health, safety and well-being for the children was well established in the school, but now all staff are considering their own

well-being."

She said the assessor for the award was pleased to see how the two primary schools at Llangwm and Burton had worked together to achieve the award, having recently amalgamated to form Cleddau Reach VC Primary School. The assessor said there was comprehensive documentation and clear involvement of all staff in the award, which follows on from their work within the Healthy Schools scheme.

The Small Workplace Health Award is a pilot between Health at Work, the Welsh Government and the Pembrokeshire Healthy School Scheme.

The award is the national mark of quality for health and wellbeing aimed at organisations employing fewer than 50 people.

I am also delighted to report that on Friday 4th November the Cleddau Reach football team won the Pembrokeshire Festival Shield at Haverfordwest County Football Club. The team won each of their six matches and have been presented with a trophy and individual medals. The school team progressed to the West Wales finals in Swansea where they won several of their matches.

100 years ago

from the pages of the 'West Wales Guardian'

22nd March 1912

"Visitors to Llangwm have for many years found great difficulty in obtaining refreshments in the village. To meet this want, on and after 1st April next, tea and refreshments will be obtainable at Mrs Palmer's, Holloway House, Llangwm. Charges moderate."

5th April 1912

"A lecture explaining the National Insurance Scheme was given by Mr Howell James B.A. of Narberth on Saturday night in the National School, Llangwm."

19th April 1912

"A very pretty wedding was solemnised at Llangwm Church on Saturday morning, when the contracting parties were Mr James Brock, eldest son of Mr and Mrs John Brock, and Miss Mary Jane Palmer, eldest daughter of Mr and Mrs Richard Palmer. The bride was attired in a cream serge costume with a hat, containing a large white feather, to match. The bridesmaids were Miss Martha Brock, sister of the bridegroom, and Miss Amy Downing, Pontardulais, cousin of the bride, whilst the best man was Mr Edgar Thomas."

24 May 1912

"At last, we are able to announce to the inhabitants of Llangwm and district that enterprising young tradesman, Mr E R Palmer, has opened his new establishment. The stock consists of fancy and general drapery of every description, including casement cloths, towellings, gentlemen's neckwear, etc. Provisions of almost every domestic article can be purchased at extremely moderate prices. We are also informed that one of the leading specialities this splendid shop will be stocked with is a great and varied assortment of footwear including the latest styles in boots, shoes and slippers, straight from the factory."

Biffa Award to the Rescue

Llangwm Community
Centre was in the doldrums.
The toilets were in a grim
state and had not been
altered since the 1950s:
they were damp and cold.
They were formerly public
conveniences attached to
the Community Centre,
and were gifted by
Pembrokeshire County
Council to the community.

Conversion to eco-friendly and up to date facilities to include a disabled toilet seemed financially out of reach to the Management Trustees. Until Biffa Award came to the rescue.

Biffa Award is a multi-million pound fund which awards

grants to community and environmental projects across the UK – www.biffa-award.org.


The fund's money comes from landfill tax credits donated by Biffa Waste Services. Biffa Award is managed by the Royal Society of Wildlife Trusts (RSWT) on Biffa's behalf.

With the help of local builder, Nicky Hughes from Hook, the area has been transformed.

Mrs. Maureen Kiff, who opened the Community Centre in 1974, cut the ribbon on the new toilets on the 20th April 2012.

Residents of the village and everyone linked to the project were invited for tea and cakes — a wonderful day of celebration.





We left Llangwm on 4th April and gathered with other South Wales cars at Llandeilo before heading north. Within a few hours we hit first sleet and then snow, which packed itself on to the windscreen requiring a number of stops to clear it. We all reached John O'Groats by midday on 7th April and then headed south, arriving in Land's End at 11.30 on 11th April. Numerous problems arose for all the cars on that trip and two had to drop out because of engine problems. In spite of problems with her cooling fan, requiring it to be disconnected, and a cracked petrol pipe which was dribbling petrol on to a hot exhaust, Miss Daisy made it. As I explained to her the John O'Groats to Land's End bit was all down hill... well, look at all the maps!

The journey home was also not without difficulty. Miss Daisy was now suffering from problems caused by all the vibration - a headlight nearly fell off, the windscreen mounts shook loose, two plug leads shook loose from the distributor, but the potentially most dangerous was the petrol pump which is bolted to the crank case vibrated loose, allowing six pints of oil to spread itself along the M5.

But we made it home safely to Llangwm at 5.30pm on Friday 13th April. Funnily enough, that morning when I realised the date, I was expecting trouble. I just didn't know what it would be.

Thank you all again for your generosity and finally I have to say that I am so proud of that little car, which was designed just after World War One and had a price tag of just £100.00. She was never designed for a gruelling run, which amounted to driving for nine hours a day for ten days and completing a distance of 1,994 miles. So in reality, she completed the JOGLE twice.



New Tricks for Old Dogs

Did you see "Britain's Got Talent," with Ashleigh and Pudsey, her dog, doing their routine? Have you ever wondered how to teach your dog to do movements like that? SENIORS





The Junior section of Llangwm Rugby Club began training way back in September this season, and we kicked off the season with a very successful 'Welcome Day'. The Welcome Day was an opportunity to have some fun whilst introducing the game to new players. 'Cleverly' we managed to choose the same day as Wales were playing an all important match in the World Cup in New Zealand. However with a good radio reception and a supply of drinks, crisps and sweets, (and a few wet sponges) we managed to keep everyones attention.

There was a lot of excitement surrounding this season, as thanks to very generous sponsorship from many local businesses (most either based in Llangwm or with Llangwm connections) we managed to supply all our teams with a new set of shirts. We are also fortunate to have a number of new coaches stepping forward to help out. We started the season with at least two coaches at each age group, and with a few more volunteers to undertake the coaching course we hope this will continue into next season.

We currently have 5 junior sides playing. The under 9s, 10s and 11s play tackle rugby and the under 7s and 8s play tag rugby. All sides got off to an enthusiastic and successful start to the season, and have continued to grow in confidence with each game. Highlights of the season included very successful away trips to both Pembroke Dock and Narberth. The junior section relies heavily on the enthusiasm and support of the parents and also a group of dedicated coaches who supply seemingly unlimited levels of encouragement and patience to all the children. We are also supported by some local teenagers who regularly help out. A junior committee meets once a month to try and help organise the section and more volunteers are always welcome.

Various events take place throughout the year, including a Halloween party, a children's Christmas party, and the all important presentation evening on the 4th May. This presentation evening we had a guest appearance from Wales' Triple Crown. All teams will also be attending a rugby festival in Kidwelly in mid May.

Matches generally take place in Llangwm at 11am on Sunday mornings and on most occasions teas, coffees bacon rolls and the obligatory raffle tickets are available. There is often a small but vocal group of parents and family providing encouragement and support to the children. All positive support for our teams is very welcome. We currently have around 70 children who are registered to play for Llangwm junior section. Training takes place on Wednesday evening weather permitting.

In addition to our current age groups, next year we will also be running an under 12s team, so any children between the ages of 6 and 12 regardless of previous rugby experience are more than welcome to join the junior section and help Llangwm junior rugby section to continue to grow.

Winter & Spring Nature Notes

Since I last wrote at the end of October 2011, Llangwm Pill has been

occupied or visited regularly by the usual species of waterbirds including teal, mallard, shelduck, wigeon, Canada geese, little grebe, dunlin, redshank, curlew, greenshank, black tailed godwits, lapwing, snipe, heron, little egret and our resident mute swans.

Although numbers varied over the winter months, some species were present in larger numbers than usual. Teal peaked at c.150, lapwing at c.350 and dunlin at c.150. Redshank numbered around 40 birds. These numbers varied depending on conditions of tide and weather.

Apart from our two mute swans, two mallard drakes, a single shelduck and a few gulls, all had departed by 5th April rendering the Pill virtually devoid of birdlife...until the redshank and black headed gulls return again at the end of July into August.

Noticeable by its absence last winter was the *spotted redshank* which had overwintered in Llangwm for seven consecutive years. Presumably it has migrated to that great estuary in the sky!

Despite the general mildness of the weather throughout the winter the feeders in the garden continually attracted a variety of birds, most commonly *chaffinches* and *goldfinches* on the nyjer seeds. We also had visits from *great spotted woodpeckers* and *nuthatches* most days who, along with various members of the tit family, made short work of the nuts. Unfortunately, we did not see any *siskins* or *bramblings* at all throughout the winter. The *blackthorn* and *hawthorn* berry crop was rapidly decimated by an influx of redwings and occasional fieldfares during November.

Notable sightings over the winter months included:-

- A female $\it black \, redstart \, at \, Llangwm$ Ferry on $\it 26^{th} \, November$
- A fine *goshawk* skirting the top edge of Benton Woods on 30th November. Another goshawk (or maybe the same bird) was seen flying along the tideline at Llangwm Ferry on 9th January spooking all the lapwing into the air. Someone described the goshawk as resembling a

sparrowhawk that has been on a course of steroids!

- A *black necked grebe* off Llangwm Ferry on 28th December
- A *whooper swan* flying downstream on 28th January
- 3 *Slavonian grebes* off Llangwm Ferry on 2nd February
- A *merlin* on the Cunnigar on 3rd February

I was pleased to see two *yellowhammers* in the lane to Ashdale House on 5th February. These lovely, once common buntings are now rarely seen or heard, their numbers having been decimated by radical changes in agricultural and hedge clearance and topping. Their distinctive call resembling the phrase "a little bit of bread and no cheese" was synonomous with country lanes when I was a youngster.

- Ospreys have already been sighted in the vicinity of Sprinkle Pill. Are they just passing through or are they going to stick around all summer, as they did last year? The burning question is...will they eventually decide to nest and breed? Wouldn't that be just marvellous?

Very cold weather in mainland Europe caused a huge influx of starlings into Britain in early February. Over a period of a couple of weeks, a flock numbering a few thousand birds used the trees surrounding the Old Rectory for roosting. Sitting at my desk near the window I was treated to some spectacular aerial displays during the half hour or so at dusk before they settled down for the night. One evening, they settled in the trees surrounding our garden for 15 minutes or so. What a sight! All the trees were completely encrusted with what appeared to be sinister black fruit. Their collective chattering created an amazing sound... more a cacophony than a "murmuration" (the collective term for starlings). As the month progressed they moved on and their numbers dwindled.

A rather intriguing incident took place on or around 7th February..."The Mystery of the Headless Swan"! I found the headless and neckless carcass of a young mute swan early one morning on the Guildford shore of the Pill. Its demise had been very recent but despite the body, loose feathers and a trail of blood, the head (presumably still attached to the neck) was nowhere to be seen. Who or what had perpetrated this dastardly deed...a fox, possibly? Or could it have been one, or both, of our

resident swans who are very, very territorial? They have been seen mercilessly attacking unsuspecting intruders in the past. Anyway, in the absence of witnesses or damning evidence we have to be content with an open verdict on this one.

The rookery at the Mill has significantly fewer nests this year. I counted 45 as opposed to 70+ last year. We initially had 12 nests built in the trees surrounding our garden. However, excessive wind and rain in April has reduced this number to 8.

The unusually warm March resulted in spring arriving very early with horse chestnut buds breaking on 13th March, sycamore buds on 21st March. I saw my first bluebell in flower in Port Lion on 18th March and more bluebells, cow parsley and alexanders in flower along the lane to Edwards Pill on 23rd March. I heard my first chiffchaff singing near Dumpledale on 22nd March. Small tortoiseshell, peacock and common blue butterflies were evident in our garden between 24th and 29th March together with numerous ladybirds on the dry buddleia flower spikes. During this last week or so I have seen several orangetip and small white butterflies on the wing. Bumblebees were also about in the garden as early as the second week of March.

Then everything went havwire! April turned very cold, wet and often windy with several morning frosts down here at the bottom of the village. Spring seemed to come to an abrupt halt and everything slowed down, particularly leaf growth on trees. As I write this on May 5th there are still many trees, particularly ash and oak, that are barely showing any signs of their buds breaking. I saw my first swallow of the year on 14th April (late by normal standards) and it is only now that they and their house martin cousins are beginning to arrive in significant numbers.

The way things are weatherwise at present, we had all best heed the advice: "ne'er cast a clout 'til May is out''! I'm never sure if the old wives are referring to the hawthorn blossom or the month of May.

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
