Good news for the Village Hall...

We now have 80 smart blue and very comfortable chairs. Anyone who has spent more than an hour sitting on the 'old plastic' ones will agree these are a great improvement. However the committee are very protective and not allowing their new chairs to venture outside!

So now we have new toilets AND new chairs! The next stage is to put in an efficient heating system. Since this will be expensive to install, and the cold, damp hall has been a major issue for many years, much consideration is being given to the various types of heating system, their efficiency and running costs. We are seeking lots of advice, quotations etc before applying for a grant. I am sure it will be worth the wait!

Use of the hall has increased with regular use now by the *Village Voices Choir* and most recently a *Parent and Toddler group* has been set up.

In July we were entertained by the very successful and amusing *New Rope String Band* and once again the tickets were a sellout. No-one knew quite what was going to

happen next, it was a performance full of surprises, comedy mixed with musical talent.

I think Llangwm may have been mentioned in their next few shows, with reference to an electrical malfunction-not our fault! As we were plunged into darkness, everyone sat there presuming it was part of the act! Pimms and cucumber sandwiches were served before the performance, particularly appropriate as it was a beautiful summer's evening.

Another sunny summer's day in July, saw tea and scones being served in the hall on Festival day.

The committee plan to continue to provide various performances in the hall, following on from the successful shows so far. Once further refurbishments have been completed, we hope it will provide many more opportunities.

Full details about hiring the hall for parties, functions, classes etc are available from Pat in the shop. The old chairs can be used outside for functions or borrowed together with crockery, for a donation. A deposit is required.



Growing Your Own

In the Gardening Club I guess most of us grow at least some of our own fruit and vegetables, not to mention flowers, but everywhere you turn nowadays we are being urged to reduce food air miles and try growing our own. Not everyone has the time, space or inclination to enter wholeheartedly into this mantra, but it was nice to see that the Llangwm Allotments association has got off the ground (and into the ground!) this year. Families are rightly interested in how and where their food is grown – how much more local can you get than your own garden! Nothing beats a tomato straight from the greenhouse, warm and sweet, or an apple crisp from the tree.

I recently went to a Grow Your Own Day at the Botanical Gardens of Wales, mainly because the guest speaker was author and broadcaster *James Wong* (Author of "Grow your own Drugs" book and Radio and TV Gardening programme presenter).



A very entertaining speaker, he encouraged us to try alternative fruit and veg – many of which are more suited to our climate than the regular plants we normally grow in

the veg plot – and he certainly inspired most of us to try something different.

He encouraged us to grow what we *liked* to eat, rather than things that we were told to grow by magazines and TV programmes. Although some of the things he suggested sounded slightly exotic, apparently they were commonly grown in Victorian times, but seem to have dropped out of most seed and plant lists nowadays, (still available if you look for them), and widely used in Continental and Asian food. His Welsh grandparents started off his interest in gardening, and being a botanist had a natural interest in plants generally.

The Botanic Gardens will be starting some courses in February next year – various topics and levels, and some held in Pembrokeshire, so get onto their website

www.growingthefuture.co.uk to find out more, and also on Facebook.

The Club Programme

started in September this year with suggestions for using up Surplus Produce – 101 Ways to Use Courgettes!

October's meeting – "Fun with Apples" – was a really informative and entertaining evening, with apple tastings (Guess the Variety), a quiz on apple knowledge (not so easy), and "Identify the Disease" (impossible!) The tie breaker was which team could eat the most apple on a string in 5 minutes – great hilarity, as you can see above!

Next meeting, November 4th, has guest speaker Malcolm Berry (who has worked at the National Botanic Gardens) on "Saving Seeds – Saving Money!"

LLANGWM LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

"YOUR VILLAGE NEEDS YOU..."

2014 sees the 100th anniversary of the outbreak of the First World War; a war that changed the world for ever. Never before had so many people been involved in a conflict that proved to be a turning point in world history. It claimed the lives of over 16 million across the globe, including 13 young men from Llangwm, and had an impact on the lives of everyone.

The Llangwm Local History Society is planning to commemorate this major event through an audio visual exhibition in the Village Hall in the autumn of 2014 and a series of 5 performances involving the Cleddau Reach School. The basis of both the exhibition and performances of our living history will be stories from families in the village and the impact the War had on those who volunteered, those who fought, died, returned or stayed behind. We aim to make the whole project very personal to Llangwm and not just another exhibition on the First World War. The culmination of the exhibition and performances will be the creation of an iPad Application which would be free to download by schools and/or individuals and will be our lasting legacy. The History Society has applied for a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund to help finance this project.

Members of the Local History Society are currently conducting research for this project and we would sincerely encourage people to come forward to give us information about their family's involvement in the First World War. For example, did you know that on Feb 11th 1916, Llangwm women achieved a major victory as they protested about the high price



of butter, organised a butter boycott, with the result that there was a sensational drop in the price of the commodity.

Anyone who has undertaken family history research may have information, or those who have heard family stories, not just on those who went away to fight, but those who stayed at home to work in vital occupations, such as farming, the mines, dockyards and so on may have stories which could form part of this story. So please contact Jane Mills on 01437 890147, Liz Beresford on 01437 891500, Margaret Brace on 01437 891580 or any member of the committee and help make this a commemoration which will make a lasting legacy for future generations in Llangwm.

Visits and Talks

And at the time of writing we are looking forward to an after-dinner talk by Chris Rushton, producer/director of Time Team and the recent poignant BBC programme on the Senghenydd Mining Disaster.

Cleddau Reach VC Primary School News



We are very pleased to report that the staff and children have settled quickly and well into working at the new school site. The building provides a bright, modern and well equipped learning environment which is motivating for all who work here.

The site was officially handed over to the Local Authority by the contractor on Wednesday 27th March. This allowed the move from the former school Bases to be completed during the Easter holiday and the new school site to open on the first day of the summer term, Monday 15th April.

The hard work and dedication of the staff was vital in ensuring a successful move and a smooth transition for the children into the new site.

The staff have also supported the Headteacher in organising and running Open Evenings for Governors, Parents and members of the local communities. These evenings have been well attended and appreciated by all who came. Many visitors have commented on both the wonderful facilities at the school and the efforts of staff to establish the different learning areas in such a short period of time.



The new Cleddau Reach VC Primary was officially opened by the Chairman of Pembrokeshire County Council, Councillor Arwyn Williams on Thursday 23rd May. At present the school has eight classes with 211 children attending Cleddau Reach Primary.

Children Raise Money for Clean Water in Uganda


The children of Cleddau Reach VC Primary School have recently held a sponsored 'Zumbathon' to raise money to provide clean water for villages around Masindi in the African country of Uganda.

A terrific amount of £1423 was raised to support the work of Pembrokeshire Scouts and Hampshire Scouts who visited Masindi in August. The visit further developed links with the area and supported the development of new wells to provide fresh water for local communities.

The fund raising was inspired by an assembly led by school site manager and Pembrokeshire Scout Leader Mr. Steve Richards. He explained to the children about the work undertaken during previous visits by Pembrokeshire Scouts and told the children and staff about the difficulties encountered by a lack of clean drinking water in many villages around Masindi.

The Cleddau Reach children took part in different Zumba Dance workshops to raise funds. The workshops were kindly and enthusiastically led by Mrs Brenta Pearn who is a professional Zumba teacher.

On behalf of the Pembrokeshire and Hampshire Scouts Mr Richards extended many thanks to the children, parents, staff, families and friends who had supported the tremendous fund raising effort. Mr Nick Groves the Headteacher of Cleddau Reach added that the school was delighted with the response to the fund raising and that Cleddau Reach



was looking forward to developing strong links with local schools around Masindi.

On his return from Uganda Mr Richards explained how the funds raised were being used to provide a clean water well for over two hundred people in Masindi. He thanked the children, staff and parents of Cleddau Reach School saying 'This is a fantastic achievement by everyone at Cleddau Reach and one which they can be very proud of. There is now a slate plaque kindly donated by Paul Owen Williams of St Davids which has been placed near the well.'

How they used to sing (100 years ago):

"During the ministry of the Rev. D. M. Pryse, the radio had not yet materialised, and the Christmas Night Concerts continued to be a popular and well patronised feature of chapel life. On Christmas Evening 1912, the building filled to capacity long before the time of commencement to savour the bright and lively programme. Under the leadership of Mr. T. Hitchings and with Miss Lavinia Owen as accompanist, the choir performed with great credit. The Male Voice section delivered a very impressive rendering of 'Crossing the Bar', and a succession of songs and solos were sung by the Misses Lavinia Owen, Marion Pryse, Hilda Saies, Ivy Morgan and Gladys Llewellyn.

In 1879 St. Jerome's Church went through a major renovation to make it fit for the future. Sadly in Victorian times heritage was regarded as unnecessary, redolent of a bygone age and with 'modernity' being the name of the game, people should be looking to the future, not the past. So while St. Jerome's became a church to make Victorian Llangwm proud, much of its medieval past was lost. Today we take a different view, to blend our past with our present and future, as that is what we are.

Little was done to the church during the 20th century save for the installation of electricity, a central heating system and a lot of patching up to attempt to keep the building dry. That last battle has become a losing one and more drastic action is required. But the funds required today are well beyond the reach of a small community like ours, so the decision was made to approach Heritage Lottery and make a bid for financial support.

There is one small almost forgotten part of Llangwm's past that provides a calling card that will, we hope, appeal to the Heritage Lottery Board and significantly improve our chances for support. That is the story of the Flemish settlers who came here between 1105 and 1150 and made


Llangwm their home. It was Flemish craftsmen who built the present church and they brought with them a language and culture.

So in September we submitted a bid that will provide funds to renovate St. Jerome's Church and improve its facilities. In the bid we've also asked for funds to allow the community to undertake archaeological and documentary research into the lives of the De la Roches, Llangwm's Lords of the manor until the early 15th century and of the ordinary Flemish families who also lived here, and with that information gathered to establish a state of art digital exhibition that tells the story of our Flemish past.

It will be a mammoth task and requires development money simply to enable us cost out the whole project, itself hopefully starting in January 2015. The development period will last from January to September 2014, when we bid for the bulk of funds to deliver the

We will hear just before Christmas if we are to receive the development funds. Should we get the green light, then the Heritage Llangwm Team will be holding meetings and briefings in the New Year to inform the community what exactly is planned and how they can help when the delivery phase starts in 2015.

Extract from 'Old Haverfordwest' by W.D. Phillips, a collection of articles from the Pembroke County Guardian of 1924/5:-

Political Fireworks at Llangwm

From Llangloffan we drove back to Haverfordwest. I attended several other meetings, and one of them I have occasion to particularly well remember. This was at the celebrated village of Llangwm, on the river Cleddy, about six miles from Haverfordwest.

The meeting was an evening one, and in conjunction with Mr. J. Howard Davies, the second son of the Liberal candidate, who practised as a solicitor for some years in Old Jewry, London,

(and now a clergyman of the Established Church of England), we purchased an ample supply of fireworks, consisting of squibs, sky rockets, Roman candles, etc, to enliven the village. After the meeting in the schoolroom, we proceeded down the village and distributed the fireworks among the villagers, and Mr. Howard Davies and I assisted in making things "hum".

A few days after, I received a summons to appear before the Haverfordwest Bench of magistrates for setting off fireworks in the village "contrary to the Act in that case made and provided". I duly appeared and found that a young lady, named Palmer, had also been honoured with a similar summons. The sessions

room was crowded, Mr. William Vaughan James was magistrates' clerk at the time, and, as usual, he elicited roars of laughter by his witticisms. P.C. Webb appeared to give evidence, which he did in a very solemn and impressive manner, and Miss Palmer and I were fined 5s. each, without costs, both of which penalties I, of course, promptly paid. The local Press made great fun of the matter, and had a flaming heading to its report of the case as "Political Fireworks at Llangwm". The election resulted in a largely increased majority for Mr. Davies of about 1,400, if I remember correctly.

Every time I wander into Waterstones there seems to be something new. 'The Saturday Big Tent Wedding Party' is well worth a few hours of your time. There are few surprises with him but a consistency of performance that is impressive.

From an earlier age 'Diary of a Nobody' by George Grossmith is different from any book that I have read. It will raise a regular smile throughout.

The Scandinavians seem to be dominant in the world of crime fiction – Jo Nesbo, Stieg Larsson, Haken Nesser, the list goes on. If you haven't tried Camilla Lackberg why not start with 'The Ice Princess'?

I recently had an interesting chat with Bobby Richards at the Macmillan fundraising event put on by Matthew at the Cottage Inn. He spoke about some of his favourite authors and types of writing, some known, some unknown to me. This has prompted me to suggest that if there are any books that you would like mentioned in this part of the Newsletter don't hesitate to let me know.

Two further points. I raised the issue of Books v. Kindle some issues ago. My strong sense is that whilst appreciating the virtues of electronic books most would miss the appearance, construction and feel of 'real' books if they were ever to disappear. Finally, I can't not mention the passing of the great Elmore Leonard, a giant of American writing. His advice to writers was, 'Try to leave out the part that readers tend to skip.' Wise words.

World War One and Llangwm

In advance of events planned next year in commemoration of the First World War, it is interesting to see how the progress of the war and its effect on life in Pembrokeshire was reported in our local newspapers.

It would appear that by 1916 the repercussions of the Great War were impinging on life at home to a greater degree. Daylight saving (or 'summer time') was first implemented here on 21st May 1916, following its introduction in Germany the previous month.

Probably the biggest change at home was the introduction of the conscription under the Military Service Act 1916. Every male British subject, ordinarily resident in Great Britain, aged 18-40, was to be conscripted into military service. Exemptions were granted to four categories of men - those engaged in work 'expedient in the national interest', those whose families would suffer 'serious hardship', ill-health or infirmity and conscientious objectors. Lists of certified (or exempted) occupations were revised from time to time. These occupations included those working in agriculture, various types of manufacturing and metalworking, food production and coal mines. There were also exemptions for categories such as policemen, lifeboat men and harbour pilots, ministers of religion and, apparently, accountants.

Appeals against conscription were heard at local tribunals and reported in the local newspapers. From these appeals, information can be gleaned about life in the Llangwm area at that time. The following examples are taken from the 'West Wales Guardian' in July and August 1916.

Alfred James, aged 39, was a water bailiff at Little Milford and married with five children. He was granted a conditional exemption provided he went to work in a munitions factory.

Edgar Stanley Thomas, aged 28, was the son of John Thomas of Deerland, farmer and butcher. Until 12 months previously, Edgar had been in the Metropolitan Police Force but he had returned home to help his father in slaughtering animals for the butchery. He was granted a conditional exemption for 3 months.

Joseph Thomas, aged 40, of 'The Poplars', Hook, was an insurance agent with the Prudential. He was married with two young children and stated that his mother-in-law Alice Macken was also dependent on him. As his occupation was considered analogous to a one-man business, he was granted a conditional exemption.

Albert George Thomas, aged 18 and employed as a teamsman [caring for a team of working horses], was one of the five sons (and four daughters) of James Thomas, farmer, of Tally-Ho. As none of his five adult sons had enlisted, the appeal was dismissed.

James Stanley Anstee, aged 26 and a baker, of Main Street, Llangwm, claimed that there would be "no-one to manage the business if called up". He stated that he baked every day of the week and used 10 sacks of flour a week. As there were three other bakers in Llangwm village at that time, he was given one month's exemption with no right to appeal. At this appeal, it was reported that the village of Llangwm was very prosperous as compared with the neighbouring village of Hook.

At such a serious time in the history of Britain, the 'West Wales Guardian' was happily able to report that, in September 1916, Trooper David Harries George, son of George Pritchard George of Nash, had won the 100 yards boot-lacing race in his regimental sports recently held "somewhere in France".

LLANGWM NATURE NOTES

2013 has, most certainly, been a year of contrasts. The first four months brought severely cold weather which lasted until early May. This resulted in spring arriving very late indeed.

Hard winter

Nesting songbirds were caught out by the cold and this combined with the late emergence of insect food resulted in many failed first broods. Rooks suffered a particularly poor breeding season. The rookery along the Mill lane had the fewest occupied nests that I can remember. Only two of the six nests in our garden were successful. Trees were late coming into leaf with some ash and oak not breaking out fully until late May and early June.

Blossoming spring

However, when spring did arrive it did so with some panache. Countrywide we saw phenomenal swathes of buttercups with some meadows appearing almost solid yellow. The same applied to roadside verges. Also, bluebells gave us the best display for many a year.

Nature in abundance

Spring rapidly turned to summer... and, oh, what a summer!
Everything suddenly flourished.
Butterflies were in great abundance and the extended warm weather has enabled the much-reduced population of *small tortoiseshells* to re-establish themselves. There were occasions when I counted seven different species of butterfly on our buddleia tree at one time... including *peacock*, *red admiral*, *comma*, *small tortoiseshell*, *speckled wood*, *large white* and *green-veined white*. The only

species noticeable by its absence in our garden this summer was the painted lady.

Fruits of the earth

It has also been a bumper summer for fruit production including possibly the best crop of blackberries I've ever witnessed

which fruited in profusion from mid-August to early October. Picking said blackberries was also an opportunity to familiarise myself with the insect life that thrives in bramble patches...including a fascinating variety of spiders, beetles, bugs and flies. One very attractive species of spider that I encountered was the *comb footed spider* with its beautiful green, cream and brown stripes and the small pale green *crab spider*.

In the Pill...

Throughout the year the water bird populations in the Pill followed their usual patterns. By mid-April all the waders and wildfowl had left for their breeding grounds leaving a couple of non-breeding *mallards* and occasional *curlew*.

In late June the first of the *redshanks* re-appeared. By late July there were a couple of dozen redshank accompanied by a small flock of 9 *dunlin*, sporting their summer plumage, present on most days. The first (female) teal arrived

back in late August and the numbers of all wintering species have increased steadily since. For some reason the male teal always arrive around six weeks after the females. I am writing this on the 10th October and early this morning, with the tide half in, there were large numbers of redshank, teal, twenty one mallard, a little egret, three little grebes, half a dozen curlew. our two resident mute swans and a dozen Canada geese in addition to a host of very noisy black headed gulls. Last Sunday afternoon there was a great crested grebe in its winter garb fishing off Llangwm Ferry and a solitary spotted redshank at Port Lion. Over the last year I've seen kingfishers in the Pill and around the shore on many occasions. Their numbers seem to be pretty healthy at the present time.

Flocks of geese

The Canada geese have been much in evidence over the last 2 months with possibly in excess of 300 being present in the Pill on several days back in September. Among this throng were also a pair of greylag geese. These geese provide the most wonderful wake-up call in the mornings at this time of the year as they take off from the Pill and fly low over our house calling loudly to each other.
