

History was being re-lived this summer as two Llangwm cocklewomen helped celebrate 100 years of the Women's Institute (WI).

Throughout the country this inspiring women's organisation is celebrating its centenary reflecting important events since its foundation in 1915. The main attraction, throughout 2014 and 2015, is the journey of the **Centenary Baton**. It will be visiting every WI on its journey, completing its travels in 2015. As the baton passes from one WI to another there will be local celebrations.

The baton spent one week with Pembrokeshire Federation having arrived from Ceredigion. Locally it was transported by sail up the River Cleddau from Dale WI to Burton WI and then on to Freystrop and District WI. Representing Freystrop and District WI, the first members to receive the baton were two Llangwm Fisherwomen on the shore at Black Tar. Compass Fishermen (women) were next at Hook and then it continued its journey to the Freystrop Miners.

Arriving at Freystrop Village Hall local WI members were entertained by hearing the history and tales of the Fisherwomen, Fishermen and Miners. Then, in true WI fashion, members enjoyed a sumptuous strawberry cream tea.

The baton continued its journey throughout Pembrokeshire before being handed into the care of the Carmarthenshire Federation.

The exhibition too is taking shape. Mark Thomas at the County Museum has been working hard getting the information panels into shape. They contain some fascinating stories about the deeds of local heroes on the front line, as well as those who kept life going at home.

The exhibition, in Llangwm Village Hall, will be open from November 4 to 10, from 2.00 pm to 8 pm.





TALKS and VISITS

More from the History Society...

As well as all the research we have been doing over the winter (and summer) months, the History group has been holding events of general interest with a lively 'Talks and Visits' programme.

On 31 March Terry John gave a stunning (no-notes) talk on the Pembrokeshire connection with 'The Lusitania'. On 19 May Pat Swales Barker illustrated her talk on 'Towns through Time' with past and present photographs of Haverfordwest and Milford Haven. Ted Goddard gave an excellent illustrated talk on the early years of Pembroke Dockyard (2 July).



National Park Voluntary Wardens Gordon Lewis and Peter Royle led us on a minibus tour of the east and west sides of Castlemartin Range on 3 August (guns not firing that day!) A fascinating look at the disused medieval farms, hill forts, cliff geology (including a fossil hunt) and natural history of this completely uncultivated section of the Pembrokeshire Coast. This photograph was taken in front of the 'drowned mill' at Frayneslake on the range.

We had a well attended ploughman's lunch and talk on 6 September by Simon Hancock on WWI in Pembrokeshire.

After the busy Exhibition and Opera period over the coming weeks of November we hope to hold a Xmas celebration after our AGM on Dec 10th (7pm), with talks resuming in the New Year. Watch for a further talk in January by Terry John, on Pembrokeshire in the Civil War, a further chance to visit Castlemartin in the spring, and a North Pembrokeshire outing to several places of historic interest, as the year progresses. And membership is only £5 a year, from April to March! (MB)

Llangwm & District **Gardening Club News**

What a lovely Summer this year - all the winter wet forgotten, everything growing so well, good harvests and a sense of wellbeing. Having just picked a bumper crop of damsons I am trying to find ways of using what is left after making a ton of jam! The damson bush is only a small tree sprouting from the hedge, but it struck me how lucky we are to get fruit like sloes, damsons and blackberries just for the effort of picking them. I curse the brambles all year, until they glisten with black juicy berries – although they still fight back with prickly stems when we try to pick them. Foraging for food plants is becoming more popular, but I am very wary about being certain of identification, and need a knowledgeable person with me. My father used to come back from milking with a hat full of field mushrooms for breakfast, but I'm always afraid of ending up with toadstools. I was talking to someone recently who used to live in Cyprus, and she said she could pick asparagus in the hedgerows - so long as you had a stick to scare off the adders!

Were you one of the 45,000 people taking part in the annual **Big Butterfly Count** this summer? What a lovely excuse for sitting in the garden enjoying the sun!

The results have been published recently, and many common species have increased by 30 to 50%. Apparently butterflies respond very quickly to environmental changes, making them a good species for biodiversity indicators. *Red admiral* – up 43%, Common blue- up 55%, Speckled wood – up 28%, **Small tortoiseshell** – up 22%. One that was down was *Large white* – down 65%, mixed feelings about this one as I pick caterpillars off my broccoli plants!

The Garden Club has had a lively Summer. Since Easter we have had a really interesting walk around Llangwm on a Treasure Hunt, a very successful Plant Sale, and a talk from Jenny Matthews of Moorland Cottage Plants on **Perennials** that really will grow in Pembrokeshire. She also had some useful advice on slug control without chemicals that she uses at her Garden & Nursery at Brynberian.

The end of year **AGM & Barbecue** was enjoyed by all – thanks to Matthew for putting on such a good Barbie. The Joe Neal Cup Competition this year, traditionally held after the AGM, was won by Maureen John with a lovely pink Calla lily.

Cleddau Reach VC Primary School News

Welcome to the Cleddau Reach VC School section of the newsletter. The items below provide information about some of the events and activities that have taken place recently.

During the 2013 - 2014 school year the staff and children settled very well into the new building and site. The school provides a wonderfully bright and well equipped environment for learning. The standards of attainment within the school remain high and place Cleddau Reach significantly above the Welsh and Local Authority averages. At present 221 children attend the school.

Funds Raised for Defibrillator Unit



During the summer term the staff, children and families of the school were successful in raising funds to purchase a defibrillator. These portable units are used in the event of a suspected heart attack.

Members of staff from Cleddau Reach took part in the CARTEN 100 charity cycle ride and all the children within the school participated in a sponsored fun run.

The defibrillator unit is available to anyone on the school site should the need arise and can also act as a community resource.

The 2014 Pembrokeshire Enterprise Fair

The children in Year 5 recycled a range of materials when designing herb and plant holders for the Pembrokeshire Enterprise Fair. They also grew many of the plants and herbs from seed. Year 5 had a very enjoyable day selling and discussing their products with potential customers in Castle Square Haverfordwest.



A Special Guest Welcomed to Premiere of Documentary Film made by Children at Cleddau Reach

A film celebrating the centenary of Dylan Thomas's birth was premiered at Cleddau Reach VC Primary School in July. The film was developed by children who are members of our Film Club.



The documentary film entitled 'A Sense of Place: finding poetry in our own community' involved the children in scripting, filming and editing. The documentary, filmed on location in Llangwm and Laugharne, focused on how characters and places from local communities can inspire poetry.

The young filmmakers, their teachers and families were joined by a very special guest at the premiere. Dylan Thomas's grand-daughter Hannah Ellis, who had been interviewed by Year Five and Year Six pupils as part of a documentary travelled to Llangwm for the premiere as part of her support of events celebrating the centenary of her grandfather.

The audience enjoyed watching not just the documentary, but also the full interviews, plus some photographs of the children while they were out and about on location. While making the film, some of the pupils visited and filmed in Laugharne and were lucky enough to go inside Dylan Thomas's famous writing shed. The children spoke about their experiences of film making, and afterwards they interviewed Hannah Ellis on the stage.



They asked Hannah lots of questions, ranging from how she has learned about her grandfather, to what her favourite works of his are, and who is the most famous person she has met - with singer Tom Jones receiving the most gasps from the children.



Speaking after the film's premiere, Hannah said: "I really enjoyed the film and the way the children have been inspired by the work of my grandfather to take a look at their own village"

"They have highlighted many similarities between Laugharne and Llangwm and I am sure that if my grandfather were alive today he would have loved the film and been inspired by what he saw."

The school has entered the film into a number of educational film festivals that are taking place across the United Kingdom this year.

The school's film club began again this September for children from Year 2 up until Year 6.





Outdoor Schools

Cleddau Reach is one of the Pembrokeshire Outdoor Schools. This means that as a school we actively encourage the children to use the outdoor environment of the school as a rich stimulus for learning. It also involves the school in making a commitment to regularly develop the children's understanding of different outdoor environments within Pembrokeshire and beyond.

During 2013-2014 we started to develop different environmental projects within the school grounds. Each class has been involved in planting projects and the Key Stage 2 classes grew and harvested a range of fruit and vegetables. The photograph shows Year 5 children harvesting their potato crop.



Summer Sporting Success

During the summer term the school successfully competed in a wide range of sporting competitions.

The girls cricket team reached the semi-finals of the Pembrokeshire Kwik Cricket Competition. The mixed cricket team were regional winners and for the third year running were successful in reaching the South Wales finals in Cardiff. During the season the school established good links with Llangwm Cricket Club. We would like to thank the club members who supported our development of cricket skills at the school.



In tennis the Cleddau Reach team reached the Pembrokeshire Final and were runners up to Mary Immaculate. In the boys singles competition Cameron Bartlett won all of his matches to become Pembrokeshire Primary Champion.

In July the school held Sports Afternoons at the school for Foundation Phase and Key Stage 2 children. Both were enjoyable and well attended events.

One Hundred Years Ago

From the pages of the **'Pembroke County Guardian'** and the **'Haverfordwest and Milford Haven Telegraph'** newspapers: -

1st July 1914


"The shabby action of Haverfordwest Rural District Council in refusing to adopt the plans of the proposed **new road** to enable Hook and Freystrop people to attend their market town called forth some strong protests ------ the question of a road from Hook to Haverfordwest had been under consideration for nearly 35 years. The original scheme was to make a road connecting with the District Council road at Fern Hill." [The road finally opened in 1922.]

24th July 1914

"Under the auspices of Llangwm Institute, very successful **athletic sports**, consisting of foot, cycle and pony races, were held in the Pill Park."

"One mile **pony** race for 14.2 hands and under – this was an exciting race, but unfortunately the third horse Mr J Hancock's 'Surprise' came to grief in the last round. The jockey J Evans of Edgecombe Farm was badly thrown. The crowd rushed across the course and some of the officials picked up Evans and found him in a dazed condition. He was badly cut about the face."

(Does anyone know where Edgecombe farm was?)
"In the evening, dancing was heartily indulged in, the music being supplied by the Pembroke Dock Temperance Band.

16th September 1914

"The children of Llangwm have picked and delivered 2 consignments of **blackberries** of 212 lbs and 60 lbs respectively, to the Pembrokeshire Branch of the Red Cross Society"

23rd September 1914

"Tomorrow Mr & Mrs John Philpin, Llangwm House, Llangwm, celebrate their **golden wedding** ------ of the marriage, there were ten children, of whom four are now living: Mr Tom Philpin, Llangwm; Mr Henry Philpin, Devonport; Mrs Skone, Milford Haven, and Mr James Philpin, Llangwm."

[Mrs Annie Skone was the wife of John James Skone and, in 1911, they were living at Merlins Hill, Haverfordwest.]

2nd October 1914

"Mr Phillips, a naval pensioner, of Llangwm who left to re-join the Navy, when the Royal Naval Reserve was called up, is amongst those who went down with HMS Cressy."

[Stephen Arla Phillips, aged 45, husband of Hannah Phillips of Black Tar, was actually on board HMS Aboukir as an armourer when both vessels were sunk by a German U-Boat on 22nd September when on patrol in the North Sea.]





HMS Cressy and HMS Aboukir, both sunk on 22 September 1914 with devastating consequences for families in Llangwm.

21st October 1914

"A notice has been issued, under the Defence of the Realm Act, prohibiting the possession of carrier and homing pigeons without written permission of the police."

30th October 1914

"An outbreak of fire took place in the **shop of Mrs Palmer** on Tuesday morning. Considerable damage was done, but a number of women were soon there and were able to extinguish the outbreak."

[Mrs Ellen Palmer was the wife of William Palmer of Holloway House where they ran a bakery and grocery business.]

25th November 1914

"It will be gratifying to the many friends of Mr James Edwards in his native village of Llangwm to learn that the London City Council have recently appointed him to the head mastership of a large boys' school under their jurisdiction, a position which carries a salary of £300 per annum."

[In 1911, James Edwards, aged 42, was living in East Dulwich with his wife and two daughters.]

30th December 1914

George Dunn of Llangwm was recruited into the Welsh Army Corps.

[George Dunn was an agricultural labourer, the son of Thomas and Maria Dunn of Hill Mountain. The Welsh Army Corps was never actually formed but evolved into the 38th (Welsh) Division which saw active service in France from November 1915 onwards.]

SUPERFAST BROADBAND NOW AVAILABLE IN LLANGWM

The 2 new fibre cabinets in Llangwm are now live.

Anybody interested in Superfast BroadBand needs to contact their Service Provider to place an order.

Fibre Broadband is the next generation of broadband - much faster, more reliable and it uses a different technology. Whilst traditional broadband (known as ADSL) is delivered via copper telephone lines, fibre broadband uses fibre optic cable. Fibre broadband can be delivered in two ways from the exchange: fibre to the cabinet (FTTC) and fibre to the premises (FTTP).

FTTC uses fibre-optic cables throughout the network right up to the street cabinet. It then uses copper wires to connect the cabinet to homes and businesses. It will provide the majority of business and residential premises with the capability of accessing broadband at speeds in excess of 30Mbps (48Mbps has already been achieved).

'Heritage Llangwm' project reaches a milestone



By the time you read this, the proposed **Heritage Llangwm** project will have completed its first stage development and the Heritage Lottery Fund will be deciding whether or not to grant us a further sum in the region of £340,000 to help the project of repairing and renovating St. Jerome's, installing a WC, kitchen facility and sustainable heating system, along with a massive research project into this community's medieval past, proceed to its conclusion.

At the same time another five charitable fund providers are deciding whether they will provide the top up funds of around £80,000 we need to complete it.

We will know the outcome of all these deliberations by Christmas and if we raise the funds necessary, the project will start in February 2015 and run until April 2016.

The Heritage Llangwm Working Group have held two public meetings and provided additional opportunities for people to see the drawings and other detail of the proposed works. If anyone missed this, please contact me, and you can come to see the plans. I'd also like to pay tribute to the Heritage Llangwm Working Group, all who have undertaken essential tasks to allow us to get all the material together for the Stage 2 bid which was submitted in September.

This is going to be a very exciting project lasting right through 2015 and into 2016. There are opportunities for the community to get involved in Medieval historic research, Archaeology, Tapestry making, photography and film making. However, in the short term, we are looking for a volunteer to make the six frames over which the tapestry fabric is to be stretched so that the volunteer needle workers can complete their task. Finally if there is anyone in the village who just wants to know more about the project and would like to become involved, again get in touch with me.

Well Worth Considering

Occasionally we stumble across a really good book but more often than not, reading whatever it may be, follows a recommendation arising from a chat/conversation. Such was the case with the novel 'A Hundred-Year-Old Man Who Climbed Out Of The Window and Disappeared'. This book, written by Jonas Jonasson (yet another Swede), was enthusiastically recommended to me by Jane Mills. I am very grateful. It's one of the cleverest and funniest novels I have read, clever because of the way he uses history over the last hundred years and funny because of the brilliance of its satire. The main character, Allan, is and always has been a renegade which endears him to the reader and allows the author to, very humorously, mock characters as different as Stalin and a hopelessly optimistic Anglican priest touching on many famous historical characters in between. The story is told with pace and is a quick read because one's interest never flags. Put simply it's great. I've now bought his follow up, 'The Girl Who Saved The King of Sweden'. More of that at a later point.

An old favourite has come up with the goods again. In

'Bad Monkey' Karl Hiaasen is back to his very best. It's another hard-to-put-down book. If you need cheering up then this is for you.

Very different from both the above is 'Guernica' by Dave Bolin who is an American sports journalist. His subject is the village made famous during the Spanish Civil War and immortalised by Picasso's painting in which the painter captures the horrors of the flattening of that village by German and Italian warplanes with the collaboration of the then Spanish dictator General Franco on 26th April 1937. The novel traces the lives of individuals and families connected with the village at that time. Though not without its humour, this is a moving record of a key event of the last century. An early extract from this novel was used in this year's G.C.S.E. examination paper in Wales.

Frank Keating was an outstanding sports writer. The book 'The Highlights' is a collection of his articles on a range of sports written over the past fifty years. There is something here for anyone with an interest in sport.

I hope you get as much pleasure out of the above as I did. There are so many good books out there; time is the problem! Barry Childs



NATURE NOTES


Apart from August which produced a 'blip' we have enjoyed glorious weather from early April to the time of writing (mid-September).

This resulted in the early emergence at the beginning of April of flowers like bluebells and butterflies like small tortoiseshells and speckled woods. It has turned into a great summer for butterflies, although fewer commas have been seen in our garden this year.

During April, May and June when the Pill is generally devoid of water birds, whimbrels regularly passed through and I also saw occasional common sandpipers. Redshank returned earlier than usual with ten present on 22 June, quickly rising to 72 a few weeks later. This is the largest number I've recorded in the Pill for many years and may indicate a successful breeding season for redshank. The first teal arrived back on 5 August and a single green sandpiper turned up briefly on 7 September. Numerous red kite sightings have been recorded over the summer with three attracted by the silage cutting at Butterhill on 18 May.

Our resident pair of mute swans attempted to build a nest under the sea wall in Rectory Road in mid-June but they were thwarted by high tides over two days that swamped the nest. Ultimately they abandoned the idea.

AN AUSSIE INVASION!



The wildlife event that everyone in Llangwm is talking about is the arrival on 3 July of three black swans. They had previously been seen downstream and upstream of Llangwm at Dale, Lawrenny and Hook Reach. However they arrived in Llangwm, obviously liked what they saw and appear to have settled in (undoubtedly encouraged by the food being offered them by shoreside residents).

Black Swans are native to western Australia and have been introduced as ornamental birds to various collections in the UK and Europe over the last 150 years or so. Although only numbering a few

hundred (mostly captive) in the UK there is a 'wild' colony in Dawlish in Devon and a sizeable colony in the Netherlands. However, their general lack of breeding success in this country means that they are not able to sustain a growing population in the wild. So, it will be interesting to see if our black swans attempt to breed locally, should they decide to stay.

Their arrival caused much consternation with our resident mute swans. There was much posturing and threatening display between the two species and I and others have witnessed physical attacks on the mute swans by the black cob . Consequently the mute swans now ensure that they keep a cautious and respectable distance from their Aussie cousins.

Despite the aggression the black swans are unafraid of humans and will swim readily to people standing on the shore (presumably expecting to be fed.) They regularly display to one another by stretching their necks vertically and pointing their bills skywards and uttering soft, almost plaintive "whooo" sounds. They are voracious vegetarians and can often be seen out of the water at low tide consuming large quantities of bright green seaweed. In flight they display prominent white wing bars that contrast starkly with their black/brown plumage.

The origin of these individuals is unknown but they are not ringed which suggests that they have come from a wild colony and not a collection (where they would also have their wings clipped to prevent flight).

Mammal sightings have included an otter at Black Tar on the afternoon of 11 April and early in the morning on 21 May three smallish cetaceans were spotted briefly off Llangwm Ferry – probably harbour porpoises following fish. It is highly unusual to see these so far upstream.

Early on 13 September I was lucky enough to encounter three foxes on the forestry track above Port Lion. Two were "play fighting" in the middle of the track and I watched them for half a minute or so before they spotted me and sauntered off into the woodland. They appeared to be fully grown but were possibly young siblings.

Despite the beautiful weather there are definite signs of autumn. The trees, particularly horse chestnuts, are starting to turn and there is an abundance of blackberries and hawthorn berries. Early morning mists over the river are more frequent and that evocative sound of the Canada geese leaving their roost in the Pill in the early morning is at present virtually a daily occurrence. And the swallows are heading south.

The season has just ended with the Ladies' Supervets team topping the entire Welsh Sea Rowing Association League which includes clubs from as far afield as Ynys Mon. The team was Jane Scales, Mandi Chesterman, Mandi Phillips, and Debbie Phillips coxed by the legendary Mike Miles.
