

Another string to his bow

THE composer of the award-winning Llangwm Village Opera is showing this month that his artistic talents are not restricted to music.

Sam Howley was born in the Rhondda Valley and trained as a classical musician at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama.

Since moving to Pembrokeshire, he continued to work in the musical world, but has also painted, becoming a selling artist.

Previous exhibitions

have included solo shows at Pontardawe Arts Centre and Brecon Theatre as well as shared exhibitions at Pembroke Dock library and Art Matters in Tenby.

He was one of the featured artists at last summer's Llangwm Literary Festival and his paintings were recently displayed around Haverfordwest as part of the 'Breaking Out of the Gallery' project.

Sam, who works in a variety of mediums but primarily oil on canvas, describes himself as 'a colourist impressionist', and believes that even the most ordinary objects can be made extraordinary through art.

An exhibition of his work is on show at the Torch Theatre's Joanna Field Gallery in Milford Haven until February 25.

Group show

THIS month's exhibition at Tenby Museum Gallery will feature work by The Welsh Group, one of Wales' most established and respected group of artists.

It was founded in 1948 as the South Wales Group which at that stage consisted of both professional and amateur artists from south Wales' six leading art societies. However, by 1975 it had radically changed, becoming a professional-only collective renaming itself The Welsh Group.

Throughout its history the group has exhibited widely in Wales and internationally. It celebrated its 50th anniversary in 1998 with a publication by Dr Peter Wakelin and an exhibition in the National Museum and Gallery of Wales, followed by a tour. In 2008 a 60th anniversary was similarly celebrated with a major exhibition of current members' work at the National Library of Wales.

The Welsh Group members are not dominated by any movement, style or manifesto, but come together as professional individuals promoting and exhibiting art of high quality. Group members demonstrate a wide cross section of conceptual approaches in contemporary visual arts practice through a range of media and processes.

The Group currently has about forty active members located across the whole of Wales. Its members are amongst the best-known and respected practitioners working in the visual arts within Wales.

The exhibition in Tenby Museum runs from February 7 to March 18.
