#### **SUE HOWLEY**

Sue was born in the Rhondda Valley and studied at the Royal Welsh College of Music & Drama. She's well known as a singer, pianist and composer and works include her 'Three Shakespeare Sonnets' premiered last year, 'Four Byron Songs' for Sir Thomas Allen, and 'Sonata for Recorder and Piano'.

"When I was asked to compose the music for this project, I knew I didn't want to create a 'musical' that would devalue the subject. I hope that the music has given a different dimension to Peter's words that will help to fix in the memory the sacrifice given at that dark time in our history".

## **PETER GEORGE**

Peter is a poet, librettist and novelist based in Newport. He was awarded a Hawthornden Fellowship in 2010, is a member of the Society of Authors, the Performing Rights Society and an associate member of Literature Wales. He's currently working on a third poetry collection. "From the beginning I intended this opera to centre on the lives or ordinary men and women

who bore the heaviest burden during a war not of their making. The village depicted here coud be any village".

Carol Mackintosh is a recently-retired GP who has worked in her home town of Milford Haven for over 30 years. She is passionate about theatre in all its forms and is a founder member of Touch and Go and Artistic Licence theatre companies.
