WW1: A VILLAGE AT WAR

The original production, WW1: a Village Opera, was set in motion by a small group of committee members of Llangwm Local History Society who wanted to commemorate the centenary of the start of World War 1.

The original idea was a music hall evening of the type used to persuade young men to volunteer. committee The approached Llangwm-based composer Sam Howley - who had other ideas: a full-scale opera. The committee agreed to his ambitious plan and Sam brought in the awardwinning poet Peter George from Newport as librettist.

A grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund set the ball rolling and

History Society members began researching the historical background.

Carol Mackintosh came in as director and WW1: a Village Opera was performed five times in 2014 in Llangwm. Haverfordwest and Newport, to sell-out audiences. A DVD of the production was also produced. Two years later a concert version was performed as part of the St David's Cathedral Festival.

The production went on to win first prize in its category in the UK-wide Remember WW1 2016 competition. The judges described it as one of the is featured in this souvenir finest musical creations of the programme.

Funding for this new production marking the Armistice has come from the Armed Forces Covenant, which supports the armed forces community.

The Battle of the Somme and its devastating consequences are brought home to Josie when she hears a tragic love story involving her own great great grandparents.



SAYING GOODBYE



Three quarters of a million men had volunteered in the UK by the end of September 1914. After two years of war that number had grown to three million.





Pals Battalions were set up by the British Army so that men who'd enlisted together in local recruiting drives could also serve together. Britain was the only country to do this.



LIFE GOES ON



When conscription began in the UK in March 1916 it was limited to single men aged from 18 to 40. In May 1916 it was extended to married men and in the last months of the war in 1918 the age limit was raised to 51. Large numbers of women were recruited into 'men's' jobs, including the police force, and in villages it was left to women and older men to run the farms and the fishing boats.







Llangwm women held chapel teas for men home on leave. They also knitted socks and other items for the boys.



IN THE TRENCHES







Altogether in the UK six million men were signed up to fight in WW1.

Seven hundred thousand died or went missing - 11.5%.

No fewer than five sets of brothers from the Llangwm area served their country.

Two of three sons of a family who'd emigrated to Canada before the war enlisted in the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Both died on the same day at Lens in Northern France.

Seventeen Llangwm men lost their lives in the war.
